**SUBJECT: ACCEPT THE ALAMEDA COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE ANNUAL MILITARY EQUIPMENT REPORT, APPROVE INCREASES TO PREVIOUSLY APPROVED ITEMS, AND THE ACQUISITION OF NEW ITEMS, REVIEW AND MAKE REQUIRED DETERMINATIONS AND ADOPT A RESOLUTION MAKING REQUIRED FINDINGS PURSUANT TO THE ASSEMBLY BILL 481 REGARDING GENERAL ORDINANCE CODE TITLE IX, CHAPTER 9.45, MILITARY EQUIPMENT USE POLICY**

Dear Board Members:

**RECOMMENDATIONS:**

- A. Accept the Annual Military Equipment Report for the reporting period of September 1, 2024 to August 31, 2025;
- B. Approve increases in quantities of previously approved military equipment items in Category 14 (PepperBall Less Lethal Launcher and Projectiles);
- C. Approve the acquisition of a replacement Armored Personnel Carrier in Category 2, Rifles in Category 10, and PepperBall Less Lethal Launcher and Projectiles in Category 14;
- D. Review and make determinations required by CA Government Code Section 7071(d) and (e) as listed on page three and four of this Board letter; and
- E. Adopt a Resolution making required findings pursuant to Assembly Bill 481 regarding General Ordinance Code Title IX, Chapter 9.45, Military Equipment Use Policy.

**BACKGROUND:**

On September 30, 2021, Governor Newsom signed AB 481 into law. AB 481 is intended to increase transparency, accountability and oversight surrounding the acquisition and use of military equipment by state and local law enforcement. This bill requires any law enforcement agency to obtain approval from the agency's governing body before purchasing, raising funds for, or acquiring military equipment, by any means, including requesting surplus military equipment from the federal government. AB 481 requires each law enforcement agency's governing body to adopt a written Military Equipment Use Policy prior to taking certain actions relating to the funding, acquisition, and/or use of military equipment.

On August 9, 2022, your Board approved Item No. 20 to adopt Ordinance O-2022-38, incorporating by reference a Military Equipment Use Policy and accepting the inaugural 2022 Military Equipment Report as required by AB 481. A second reading, Item No. 87, was approved on September 20, 2022.

On December 19, 2023, your Board approved Item No. 82, accepting the 2023 Annual Military Equipment Report and adopting amendments to Title IX, Chapter 9.45 of the General Ordinance Code as required by AB 481. The second reading of Ordinance O-2024-2, Item #38, was approved on January 9, 2024. During these hearings, public input received mirrored concerns raised during the state-mandated community engagement meeting regarding:

- alternatives to the use of multi-projectile munitions;
- the application of multi-projectile munitions within Therapeutic Health Units (THU) at Santa Rita Jail (SRJ); and
- enhancements to the data retention policy governing uncrewed aircraft systems (UAS).

Responding to these issues, ACSO committed to:

- Evaluating alternatives to multi-projectile munitions.
- Discontinuing the use of such munitions within THUs.
- Consulting with data and privacy experts to amend the ACSO UAS policy.

On February 1, 2024, ACSO updated General Order 1.21 to prohibit the use of multi-projectiles in THUs at SRJ. On May 23, 2024, the ACSO presented a revised General Order 6.15 concerning the governance of small Uncrewed Aircraft Systems (UAS). Both General Orders are accessible on the ACSO Public Information Portal under Sheriff's Written Directives here: <https://www.alamedacountysheriff.org/about-us/transparency>. On July 9, 2024, your Board authorized the acquisition of five additional UAS models under Item No. 63.

On November 26, 2024, your Board approved Item No. 85, accepting the 2024 Annual Military Equipment Report and adopting the restatement and amendment to Title IX, Chapter 9.45 of the General Ordinance Code as well as the amendment to County Ordinance No. O-2024-2 to incorporate changes to General Order 2.21.02. The second reading of Ordinance O-2024-39, Item No. 40, was approved on December 10, 2024. On November 26, 2024, your Board approved Item No. 86, which amended the 2024 Military Equipment Inventory to correct the erroneous identification of a type of Winchester ammunition and approved the acquisition of less lethal military equipment.

### **DISCUSSION/SUMMARY:**

On October 21, 2025 at 6:00pm, pursuant to Government Code section 7072(b), the ACSO held the required annual community engagement meeting. The meeting was publicized through ACSO's accounts on social media platforms, posted on the agency website, and shared with partners for distribution to their social networks. The meeting was located at the Cherryland Community Center, located at 278 Hampton Road in Hayward, and streamed online for live or recorded viewing. The meeting allowed the general-public to discuss and ask questions regarding the 2025 Annual Military Equipment Report ("Annual Report") and the ACSO's funding, acquisition, and use of the equipment. During the meeting, the Command staff from ACSO provided a presentation and allowed participants to ask questions. There were only two attendees from the public, and there were no questions or concerns from the public presented during this meeting.

ACSO had planned on presenting this to the Board of Supervisors Public Protection Committee on October 23, 2025. Supervisor Marquez requested that the October Public Protection Committee meeting be cancelled and asked for the annual Military Equipment Report to move forward directly to the Board of Supervisors' regular meeting.

General Order 2.21.02 (Military Equipment Funding, Acquisition, and Use) requires the ACSO to provide your Board a detailed list of military equipment, purpose and authorized uses, fiscal impact, legal and procedural rules governing its use, required training compliance, and complaint procedures.

The ACSO is requesting your approval to purchase additional military equipment, as noted in Table 1 below. Attachments B-G are the Military Equipment Request Forms for the items in Categories 10 and 14, noted in Table 1 below, and posted to the ACSO website on August 5, 2025, as required by law. Attachment H is the Military Equipment Request form for the item in Category 2, noted in Table 1 below, and posted to the ACSO website on October 16, 2025, as required by law. Attachments I-L are ACSO General Orders that govern the use of the requested military equipment. Additional ACSO written directives, policies, and procedures related to the requested military equipment are accessible on the Sheriff's Office website Public Information Portal (<https://www.alamedacountysheriff.org/about-us/transparency>).

ACSO requests your Board to take actions necessary to comply with CA Government Code Section 7071, which includes accepting the Annual Military Equipment Report for period September 1, 2024 to August 31, 2025 (see Attachment A), determining each type of military equipment identified in the report has complied with standards for approval, approving the acquisition and increase in requested military equipment outlined in the Recommendation and detailed in this Board Letter, and finding that each type of military equipment identified above complies with the standards for approval as follows:

- (a) the military equipment is necessary because there is no reasonable alternative that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety;
- (b) the proposed Military Equipment Use Policy will safeguard the public's welfare, safety, civil rights, and civil liberties;
- (c) if purchasing the equipment, the equipment is reasonably cost-effective compared to available alternatives that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety; and
- (d) prior military equipment use complied with the Military Equipment Use Policy that was in effect at the time, or if prior uses did not comply with the accompanying Military Equipment Use Policy, corrective action has been taken to remedy nonconforming uses and ensure future compliance.

Additionally, it is requested that your Board approve a Resolution making required findings pursuant to Assembly Bill 481 regarding General Ordinance Code Title IX, Chapter 9.45, Military Equipment Use Policy.

Approval of these items maintains the critical equipment required for the Alameda County Sheriff's Office to protect public safety locally and regionally.

**FINANCING:**

No additional appropriation is required. There will be no increase in net County cost as a result of your approval.

**VISION 2036 GOAL:**

The acceptance of the Annual Military Equipment Report and the approval of the acquisition of a replacement armored vehicle meets the 10X goal of a **Crime Free County** in support of our shared vision of **Safe and Livable Communities**.

**RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF ALAMEDA, STATE OF CALIFORNIA, MAKING REQUIRED FINDINGS PURSUANT TO ASSEMBLY BILL 481 REGARDING ALAMEDA COUNTY GENERAL ORDINANCE CODE TITLE IX, CHAPTER 9.45, MILITARY EQUIPMENT USE POLICY**

RESOLUTION NUMBER R-2025-597

WHEREAS, on October 20, 2022, Board of Supervisors adopted Ordinance No. O-2022-38, hereafter referred to as Title IX, Chapter 9.45 of the General Ordinance Code (the "Military Equipment Use Ordinance"), under Assembly Bill (AB) 481 (Government Code Section 7071), adopting a military equipment use policy for the Alameda County Sheriff's Office; and

WHEREAS, AB 481 added Chapter 12.8 to Division 7, Title 1 of the California Government Code, concerning the Funding, Acquisition, and Use of Military Equipment by local law enforcement. AB 481 added Government Code sections 7070 et seq.

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 7072 requires the Alameda County Sheriff's Office to submit an annual military equipment report to the Board of Supervisors containing the information required in Government Code Section 7072(a); and

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 7071(e) requires the Board of Supervisors to determine whether each type of military equipment identified in the annual equipment report is compliant with the standards for approval set forth in Government Code Section 7071(d); and

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 7071(e) further requires the Board of Supervisors to annually review at a regular meeting the Military Equipment Use Ordinance and, subject to the determination that each type of military equipment identified in the annual military equipment report is compliant with the standards for approval set forth in Government Code Section 7071(d), vote on whether the Ordinance should remain in effect in its current form or needs any amendments to ensure compliance with the section 7071(d) standards; provided that if the Board of Supervisors determines that a type of military equipment identified in the annual military equipment report is not compliant with the standards for approval set forth in Government Code Section 7071(d), the Board of Supervisors shall either disapprove renewal of the authorization for such military equipment or require modifications to the military equipment use policy in a manner that will resolve the lack of compliance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Alameda County Board of Supervisors, having received the information required under Government Code sections 7071 and 7072, now determines that each type of military equipment identified in the annual military equipment report for September 1, 2024- August 30, 2025 is compliant with the standards for approval set forth in Government Code Section 7071(d), namely that:

- (A) The military equipment inventoried and presented to the Board of Supervisors is necessary because there is no reasonable alternative that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety;
- (B) The proposed military equipment use policy will safeguard the public's welfare, safety, civil rights, and civil liberties;
- (C) The equipment is reasonably cost-effective compared to available alternatives that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety (if any);
- (D) Prior military equipment use complied with the applicable equipment use policy (which included equipment now defined as military equipment) that was in effect at the time, or if prior uses did not comply with the accompanying military equipment use policy, corrective action has been taken to remedy nonconforming uses and ensure future compliance; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Alameda County Board of Supervisors, having made the required determination and having reviewed the Military Equipment Use Ordinance, finds that it complies with the standards for approval set forth in Government Code Section 7071(d) and satisfies the requirements of AB 481, and further finds that no modifications to the Military Equipment Use Ordinance are necessary or required.

As required by Government Code section 7070 et seq. the Board of Supervisors will review the County's Military Equipment Use Ordinance again next year after receiving the annual military equipment report from the Sheriff's Office for the reporting period September 1, 2025, to August 30, 2026.








**BACKGROUND**

In September 2021, the State of California passed Assembly Bill 481 (AB 481). This law was created because of concerns that military equipment in local communities can:

- Put public safety and welfare at risk,
- Increase the chance of civilian deaths,
- Threaten civil rights and liberties,
- Harm people's physical and mental health, and
- Create significant financial costs.

The law also recognizes that military equipment is often used more in low-income Black and Brown communities, meaning these risks are felt most by people who are already marginalized.


AB 481 requires that:

- The public must be informed about any funding, purchase, or use of military equipment by government agencies.
- The community should have a voice in decisions about buying or using this equipment.
- All decisions must consider public safety, civil rights, and meaningful public input.
- Agencies must have clear rules, transparency, and accountability before acquiring or using military equipment.
- Not having a public forum to discuss these issues can damage trust between law enforcement and the community.

To meet these requirements, AB 481 requires every law enforcement agency to:

- Create a Military Equipment Use Policy,
- Get approval for the policy from its Governing Body,
- Publish the policy at least 30 days before the approval hearing,
- Prepare an Annual Report on the use of military equipment, and
- Hold a community meeting within 30 days of releasing the report.

In response, the Alameda County Board of Supervisors adopted Ordinance O-2022-38, which added the ACSO Military Equipment Use Policy to the County's Code of Ordinances as section 9.45, effective November 20, 2022.

**INTRODUCTION**

The Alameda County Sheriff's Office (ACSO) uses certain types of military equipment to support its mission of building a safer and stronger community.

Although ACSO has a large inventory, this equipment is not used in every situation. It is only deployed in specific circumstances by specially trained staff.

Critical incidents are often unpredictable and dangerous. Having a range of tools allows ACSO to respond quickly and safely. The use of this equipment is limited to certain cases and is always guided by agency policy. When situations arise that are not fully addressed by existing procedures, the incident commander must use their judgment while considering public safety, officer safety, civil rights, and all available information.

It is the responsibility of ACSO members to use military equipment only when it is necessary to protect the public and themselves, and to resolve incidents as safely as possible.

This Military Equipment Annual Report explains ACSO's guidelines for using military equipment, lists the equipment currently held, provides cost details, and summarizes any complaints received during this reporting period



ANNUAL MILITARY EQUIPMENT USE REPORT

September 1, 2024 – August 31, 2025

OVERVIEW

Under California Government Code Section 7072, any law enforcement agency with an approved **Military Equipment Use Policy** (as required by Section 7071) must submit an **Annual Military Equipment Report** to its Governing Body. The first report is due within one year of the policy's approval, and a new report must be submitted every year that the agency continues to use military equipment. Each report must also be posted on the agency's website for public access.

Every annual report must include, at minimum, the following information for each type of military equipment used in the previous calendar year:

- **How the equipment was used** and the purpose of its use.
- **Any complaints or concerns** received about the equipment.
- **Results of internal audits**, including any policy violations and actions taken in response.
- **Total annual cost** for each type of equipment, including costs for acquisition, personnel, training, transportation, maintenance, storage, upgrades, and other ongoing expenses. The report must also state the funding source for the next calendar year.
- **The quantity of each type** of military equipment currently owned.
- **Plans to acquire more equipment** in the next year, including the quantity for each type if applicable.

Within 30 days of submitting the report, the agency must hold at least one well-publicized community meeting. This meeting gives the public a chance to ask questions and discuss the report, as well as the agency's funding, acquisition, or use of military equipment.

DEFINITIONS

Under Assembly Bill 481 and California Government Code Section 7070(c)(1–15), the following are defined as “military equipment”:

**Category 1 - Unmanned, remotely operated, powered vehicles:** Includes aerial drones and ground robots.

**Category 2 - Mine-resistant ambush-protected (MRAP) vehicles or armored personnel carriers:** Does not include police versions of standard consumer vehicles.

**Category 5 - Command and control vehicles:** Vehicles built or modified to manage and direct public safety operations.

**Category 10 - Specialized firearms and ammunition under .50 caliber:** Includes assault weapons as defined in Penal Code sections 30510 and 30515, except for standard issue service weapons and ammunition issued to officers.

**Category 12 - Flashbang grenades, explosive breaching tools, tear gas, and pepper balls:** Excludes standard handheld pepper spray.

**Category 13 - TASER® Shockwave, microwave weapons, water cannons, and the Long-Range Acoustic Devices (LRAD).**

**Category 14 - Projectile launch platforms and munitions:** Includes 40mm launchers, bean bag rounds, rubber bullets, and specialty impact munition (SIM).

**Category 15 - Any other equipment designated by a Governing Body or a state agency as requiring oversight.**


*\*Note: During this reporting period, ACSO did not possess any items from the categories below\**

**Category 3 - \*High mobility multipurpose wheeled vehicles (HMMWV or Humvees), two-and-a-half-ton trucks, five-ton trucks, or wheeled vehicles with breaching or entry tools:** Excludes unarmored ATVs and dirt bikes.

**Category 4 - \*Tracked armored vehicles:** Vehicles with tracks (not wheels) that provide ballistic protection.

**Category 6 - \*Weaponized aircrafts, vessels, or vehicles of any kind.**

**Category 7 - \*Battering rams, slugs, and explosive breaching tools:** Excludes bolt cutters and handheld rams designed for one person use.


**Category 8 - \*Firearms of .50 caliber or greater:** Excludes standard issue shotguns.

**Category 9 - \*Ammunition of .50 caliber or greater:** Excludes standard issue shotgun ammunition.

**Category 11 - \*Firearms or accessories designed to launch explosive projectiles.**

**Additional Definitions for this Report:**

- **Alameda County Board of Supervisors (BOS):** The Governing Body that oversees ACSO and approves all matters related to AB 481.
- **Alameda County Ordinance Section 9.45 of Title IX:** The ordinance that approves ACSO Military Equipment Use and Inventory.
- **Assembly Bill 481 (AB 481):** The law requiring law enforcement agencies to obtain approval for military equipment use policies under Government Code Sections 7070-7075.
- **Governing Body–Approved Military Equipment Inventory:** Lists the types and total amounts of military equipment that ACSO is authorized to purchase and maintain.
- **Military Equipment Possessed by ACSO:** The actual military equipment currently owned and managed by ACSO.
- **Consumables:** Items used once, such as ammunition, diversionary devices, chemical agents, and specialty munitions (e.g., 40mm and less lethal munitions).
- **Reporting Period:** The time frame covered by each Annual Report. Subsequent reporting periods run from September 1 to August 31 each year.
- **Special Response Unit (SRU):** A designated group of agency members who are selected, trained, and equipped to work as a coordinated team. They resolve critical incidents that are too hazardous, complex, or unusual for first responders or investigative units. The SRU employs tactics and strategies that emphasize de-escalation, control, containment, and resolution to protect life and property. This unit is also commonly referred to as the SWAT team.
- **Usage:** Any intentional or unintentional operation, launch, discharge, detonation, activation, ignition, or impact of specified equipment during an incident. For vehicles, small Unmanned Aerial Systems (sUAS), and robots, usage means performing a function that helps with an investigation or enforcement action.





Most Frequently Deployed Drone Models







**ANNUAL COST & FISCAL IMPACT**

The Alameda County Sheriff's Office (ACSO) is committed to being transparent about the costs and funding sources for all military equipment, as required by California Government Code Section 7072.

Each year, ACSO provides a summary of the total annual cost for every type of military equipment in its inventory. These costs may include:

- **Acquisition**
- **Personnel**
- **Training**
- **Transportation**
- **Maintenance**
- **Storage**
- **Upgrades**
- **Other ongoing costs**

For each item, the report also identifies the source of funds that will be used for the following calendar year.

Before purchasing new equipment, ACSO reviews whether:

- The equipment is necessary, and if other options could provide the same level of safety for deputies and the public.
- The equipment is cost-effective compared to alternatives.

Over the next 12 months, ACSO will purchase consumable items, such as ammunition and chemical agents, to maintain approved inventory levels. These costs follow existing replenishment schedules and are listed under each item in the Governing Body–Approved Military Equipment Inventory section (Appendix B).

This approach ensures that ACSO's use of public funds for military equipment remains necessary, cost-effective, and consistent with community expectations and legal requirements.

**TRAINING SUMMARY & COST**

ACSO members who use military equipment must complete specialized training for certification and regular re-certification. Members who do not keep their certification current are not allowed to use the equipment.

In addition to certifications, ACSO provides in-house training for units such as the Special Response Unit (SRU), Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD), and small Unmanned Aerial Systems (sUAS). These courses help members keep their skills up to date and ensure the safe and effective use of equipment.

Training covers the knowledge, skills, and tactics needed for responsible use and is designed to meet operational needs and law enforcement best practices.

The cost of training is paid through the ACSO budget or grants, unless otherwise noted. This ensures that only trained members use military equipment and that ACSO meets all legal and safety requirements.

**TRAINING COURSES**

During this reporting period, ACSO hosted most of the training courses completed by agency members. Hosting in-house allowed personnel to receive required skills and certifications at no additional cost to the agency.

These trainings ensured that ACSO personnel remained current on safety procedures, certifications, and professional standards.

One course was hosted by an outside provider, at a total cost of **\$1,975**.

**SUMMARY OF COMPLAINTS REGARDING MILITARY EQUIPMENT USAGE**

The Lieutenant of Support Services is ACSO's Military Equipment Coordinator. This role includes completing a yearly inventory of all items in the Governing Body–Approved Military Equipment Inventory to make sure records are accurate and accountable.

For this reporting period, there were **no violations or misuse of military equipment**. Internal reviews confirmed that ACSO followed the Military Equipment Use Policy. All agency members complied with the requirements of AB 481 and ACSO's written policies, and each division is responsible for meeting these standards.

If any violations are found in the future, they will be sent to the Internal Affairs Unit for investigation, as required by California law.

**PROJECTED ACQUISITIONS**

Assembly Bill 481 requires the Projected Acquisitions section as part of this report, and ACSO is seeking approval to acquire the listed items below and add them to its Governing Body-Approved Military Equipment Inventory.

\*Unless otherwise indicated, all costs listed below are per item.

**Category 10 – Rifles**

**Description/Capabilities, Quantity, and Cost**

**ACCURACY INTERNATIONAL, AT-X LE, .308 WINCHESTER (BOLT ACTION RIFLE):**

The Accuracy International AT-X LE is a precision bolt-action rifle built on a modular aluminum chassis with fully adjustable ergonomics, including tool-less length of pull and cheekpiece settings. Chambered in .308 Winchester with a free-floating, interchangeable barrel, the AT-X LE uses a detachable 10-round magazine and delivers superior accuracy for law enforcement applications. Designed for adaptability and durability, it provides reliable long-range overwatch during high-risk operations.

Quantity 8

Cost: \$6,375 per unit

**Category 14 – PepperBall Less Lethal Launcher and Projectiles**

**Description/Capabilities, Quantity, and Cost**

**PEPPERBALL VSK PRO PLUS, LESS-LETHAL LAUNCHER:** The PepperBall VKS Pro Plus is a less-lethal launcher designed to fire .68 caliber projectiles. It operates using compressed air or CO<sub>2</sub> and offers the flexibility of either magazine or hopper feed systems. Effective at extended ranges, the VKS Pro Plus provides officers with a safe and reliable tool for managing confrontational situations while minimizing the risk of serious injury. It is intended for controlled applications such as area security, crowd management, suspect compliance, and de-escalation during high-risk incidents.



Cost: \$1,610 each unit

**PEPPERBALL, VXR LIVE-MAXX PROJECTILES:** The PepperBall VXR Live-Maxx projectile is a .68 caliber round designed for extended distance and improved accuracy. Each projectile contains a chemical irritant payload and is intended as a less-lethal force option during critical incidents. The VXR provides officers with the ability to maintain safer engagement distances while supporting controlled applications such as suspect compliance, area security, and crowd management, all while minimizing the risk of serious injury.

Quantity: 1,000

Cost: \$2.98 per round



ANNUAL MILITARY EQUIPMENT USE REPORT

PEPPERBALL, VXR MARKING PROJECTILE: The PepperBall VXR Marking projectile is a .68 caliber round designed for extended range and accuracy. Instead of a chemical payload, it contains an indelible pink paint solution. This projectile is intended for marking suspects and objects for later identification, apprehension, or questioning. It also supports operational uses such as marking doors, openings, or other areas for visibility. The VXR Marking projectile provides a non-lethal option that aids in identification and scene management without the use of chemical agents.

Quantity: 1,000

Cost: \$3.84 per round

PEPPERBALL, JAMMER ROUND PROJECTILE: The PepperBall Jammer projectile is a .68 caliber round containing a metallic powder compound. On impact, it creates a temporary cloud of metallic particles designed to block sensors such as CCTV, LIDAR, and FLIR. This round provides officers with a non-lethal option to obscure electronic monitoring devices during controlled operations. It is intended to enhance officer safety and operational security in high-risk situations while minimizing the risk of permanent damage.

Quantity: 500

Cost: \$3.80 per round

PEPPERBALL, GLASS BREAKER PROJECTILE: The PepperBall Glass Breaker projectile is a .68 caliber solid polymer round designed to fracture glass on impact. It can be used to break residential windows or vehicle side glass when necessary. This provides officers with a non-lethal breaching option during critical incidents, supporting timely access and enhancing public and officer safety.

Quantity: 500

Cost: \$2.50 per round

PEPPERBALL, MARKING PROJECTILE: This projectile is intended for marking suspects and objects with an indelible pink paint solution for later identification, apprehension, or questioning.

Quantity: 6,000 (Previously approved for 2,000. ACSO is requesting 4,000 additional. This corrects a clerical error from the previous annual report).


Cost: \$0.89 per round

LIVE X-PROJECTILE: This projectile contains a concentration of 5% Pava power, a hard plastic frangible sphere that is designed to burst upon impact. The projectile is excellent for direct impact, area saturation and riot management. This projectile is intended as an irritant for individual suspects, point-specific targets, or small-area denial.

Quantity: 6,000 (Previously approved for 2,000. ACSO is requesting 4,000 additional. This corrects a clerical error from the previous annual report).

Cost: \$3.31 per round

INERT PROJECTILE: It is intended for training, qualifications, and direct impact. This projectile is a hard plastic frangible sphere that is designed to burst upon impact.

**UNANTICIPATED REPLACEMENT OF MILITARY EQUIPMENT**

While many equipment purchases are planned in advance, there are times when items may need to be replaced unexpectedly if they are damaged beyond repair. In those cases, ACSO will review each situation individually and decide based on operational needs.

Any unexpected purchases or replacements will still follow **General Order 2.21.02** and the requirements of **Assembly Bill 481**. This means ACSO must seek approval from the **Governing Body** before acquiring or replacing military equipment, in line with both the law and department policy.

**CONCLUSION**

The Alameda County Sheriff's Office (ACSO) has fulfilled the requirements of Assembly Bill 481 by creating **General Order 2.21.02 on Military Equipment, Funding, Acquisition, and Use**. This policy was approved by the Governing Body, is posted on the ACSO website, and is reviewed each year. Responsibility for preparing the Annual Military Equipment Report is assigned to the Lieutenant of Support Services. As required by law, a community engagement meeting is also held within 30 days of submitting this report.

This Annual Report reflects ACSO's commitment to **transparency and accountability**. It explains what types of equipment are in use, how they are funded, and how training supports their safe use. It also shows how these tools help protect both the public and deputies while supporting the safe resolution of high-risk situations.


The public has the right to know how military equipment is funded, acquired, and used. ACSO takes public safety, civil rights, and community concerns into account in all related decisions.

**PURPOSE:** To establish guidelines and procedures for the acquisition, funding, use, and reporting of “military equipment,” as the term is defined in California Government Code 7070. This General Order (G.O.) fulfills the requirements set forth in Assembly Bill 481 (2021). Requirements include, but are not limited to, seeking approval to procure, possess, and use military equipment, conducting annual reporting, maintaining inventory, and addressing public complaints, concerns, or questions regarding military equipment.

**POLICY:** The Alameda County Sheriff’s Office (ACSO) may procure, possess, or use “military equipment,” as defined in Government Code 7070, ***only in accordance*** with Assembly Bill 481 (AB 481) and ***with prior approval of the Governing Body, unless the use is already***

***authorized under the current approved Military Equipment Use Policy. This policy does not apply to military equipment used exclusively for training or promotional purposes where the use is not operationally deployed. Training activities using approved equipment in accordance with the existing Military Equipment Use Policy do not require separate Government Body approval.***

***In exigent circumstances, defined as an immediate and significant threat to life or public safety, the Sheriff or designee may authorize the use, borrowing, or leasing of military equipment without prior approval from the Governing Body, provided the event is documented and included in the next ACSO Annual Military Equipment Report.***

#### **DEFINITIONS:**

##### **CALIFORNIA PENAL CODE (PC) SECTION 13652 (AB 48)**

- A. Pursuant to PC 13652(a), kinetic energy projectiles and chemical agents shall not be used by any law enforcement agency to disperse any assembly, protest, or demonstration, except as provided in PC 13652(b).
- B. PC 13652(b): Kinetic energy projectiles and chemical agents shall only be deployed by a peace officer that has received training on their proper use by Commission on Police Officer Standards and Training (POST) for crowd control if the use is objectively reasonable to defend against a threat to life or Great/Serious Bodily Injury (GBI), to any individual, including any peace officer, or to bring an objectively dangerous and unlawful situation safely and effectively under control, and only in accordance with all of the following requirements:
  1. De-escalation techniques or other alternatives to force have been attempted, when objectively reasonable and have failed.
  2. Repeated, audible announcements are made announcing the intent to use kinetic energy projectiles and chemical agents and the type to be used, when objectively reasonable to do so. The announcements shall be made from various locations, if necessary, and delivered in multiple languages, if appropriate.
  3. Persons are given an objectively reasonable opportunity to disperse and leave the scene.
  4. An objectively reasonable effort has been made to identify persons engaged in violent acts and those who are not, and kinetic energy projectiles or chemical agents are targeted toward those individuals engaged in violent acts. Projectiles shall not be aimed indiscriminately into a crowd or group of people.
  5. Kinetic energy projectiles and chemical agents are used only with the frequency, intensity, and in a manner that is proportional to the threat and objectively reasonable.
  6. Officers shall minimize the possible incidental impact of their use of kinetic energy projectiles and chemical agents on bystanders, medical personnel, journalists, or other unintended targets.
  7. An objectively reasonable effort has been made to extract individuals in distress.

8. Medical assistance is promptly provided, if properly trained personnel are present, or procured, for injured persons, when it is reasonable and safe to do so.
9. Kinetic energy projectiles shall not be aimed at the head, neck, or any other vital organs.
10. Kinetic energy projectiles or chemical agents shall not be used by any law enforcement agency solely due to any of the following:
  - a. A violation of an imposed curfew.
  - b. A verbal threat.
  - c. Noncompliance with a law enforcement directive.
11. If the chemical agent to be deployed is tear gas, only a commanding officer at the scene of the assembly, protest, or demonstration may authorize the use of tear gas.

#### GOVERNING BODY

The elected body that oversees a law enforcement agency. For the ACSO, the **Governing Body** is the Alameda County Board of Supervisors (BOS).

#### MILITARY EQUIPMENT

Pursuant to California Government Code (G.C.) section 7070, subsections (c)(1) through (c)(16), and for purposes of this G.O., military equipment includes any of the following:

1. Unmanned, remotely piloted, powered aerial or ground vehicles.
2. Mine-Resistant Ambush-Protected (MRAP) vehicles or other armored personnel carriers. Law enforcement versions of standard consumer vehicles are specifically excluded from this subdivision.
3. High Mobility Multipurpose Wheeled Vehicles (HMMWV) "Humvees," two and one-half ton trucks, five-ton trucks, or wheeled vehicles that have a breaching or entry apparatus attached.
  - a. Un-armored all-terrain vehicles (ATV's) and motorized dirt bikes are specifically excluded from this subdivision.
4. Tracked armored vehicles that provide ballistic protection to the occupants and utilize a tracked system instead of wheels for forward motion.
5. Command and control vehicles that are either built or modified to facilitate the operation control and direction of public safety units.
  - a. As described above, supervisor patrol vehicles based on standard consumer vehicles equipped as mobile command posts do not fall under this subdivision.
6. Weaponized aircraft, vessels, or vehicles of any kind.

7. Battering rams, slugs, and breaching apparatuses that are explosive in nature.
  - a. Items designed to remove a lock, such as bolt cutters, or a handheld ram designed to be operated by one person, are specifically excluded from this subdivision.
8. Firearms of .50 caliber or greater.
  - a. Standard issue shotguns are specifically excluded from this subdivision.
9. Ammunition of .50 caliber or greater.
  - a. Standard issue shotgun ammunition is specifically excluded from this subdivision.
10. Specialized firearms and ammunition of less than .50 caliber, including assault weapons as defined in PC sections 30510 and 30515.
  - a. The exception to this subdivision is any weapon that is a standard issue service weapon and any appropriate ammunition for said weapon that are issued to sworn ACSO members.
11. Any firearm, or firearm accessory designed to launch explosive projectiles.
12. Light and sound distraction devices and explosive breaching tools, "tear gas," or "pepper Balls."
  - a. Standard issued Oleoresin Capsicum Spray (OC/pepper spray) is excluded from this subdivision.
13. Taser Shockwave, microwave weapons, water cannons, and any Long-Range Acoustic Devices (LRAD).
14. The following projectile launch platforms and their associated munitions: 40mm projectile launchers, "bean bag," rubber bullet, and specialty impact munition (SIM) weapons.
15. Any other equipment as determined by the **Governing Body** or a state agency to require additional oversight.
16. Notwithstanding paragraphs (1) through (15), military equipment does not include general equipment not designated as prohibited or controlled by the Federal Defense Logistics Agency.

#### **DEPLOYMENT AND USE**

***The deployment or use of military equipment shall refer to the use of the equipment for an authorized purpose. The mere handling of a firearm or less-lethal device is not considered a deployment. Primer-based items must be fired during an incident to be considered a deployment. Training with any of the items listed in Government Code section 7070(c)(1) through (c)(16) is excluded and is not considered a "deployment" or "use" pursuant to Government Code section 7072.***

### ACSO MILITARY EQUIPMENT INVENTORY (Military Equipment Compliance List)

A detailed list of the military equipment requested, procured, and used by the ACSO, along with its approval status will be maintained. The ACSO Military Equipment Inventory will be updated as changes are made, dated accordingly, and attached to this order.

### MILITARY EQUIPMENT COORDINATOR

This title will be held by the Planning & Research/Accreditation Lieutenant.

### MILITARY EQUIPMENT REQUEST FORM

An internal form used by Agency members to detail the requested military equipment item they wish to procure. This completed form shall be approved by the responsible Division Commander of the unit and then provided to the Military Equipment Coordinator. The Military Equipment Request Form includes all necessary information to comply with the requirements of AB 481.

### TYPE

Each item that shares the same manufacturer model number.

**ORDER:** The Military Equipment Funding, Acquisition, and Use G.O. approval, requests, and annual report process will be conducted under the direction of the Management Services Division Commander and the responsibility of the Military Equipment Coordinator. All processes will adhere to the parameters set forth in AB 481.

- A. Approval Required: The ACSO shall obtain the approval of the **Governing Body** in a regular meeting of the **Governing Body** before engaging in any of the following activities:
1. Requesting military equipment made available under Section 2576a of Title 10 of the United States Code.
  2. Seeking funds for military equipment, including, but not limited to, applying for a grant, soliciting, or accepting private, local, state, or federal funds, in-kind donations, or other donations or transfers. The ACSO has authority to apply for funding prior to obtaining **approval of the Governing Body** in the case of exigent circumstances, but ACSO shall obtain approval **from the Governing Body** as soon as practical.
  3. Acquiring military equipment, either permanently or temporarily, including through borrowing or leasing.
  4. Collaborating with another law enforcement agency in the deployment or use of military equipment within the County of Alameda and the territorial jurisdiction of **the Governing Body**.
    - a. **Mutual Aid – ACSO acknowledges that critical incidents are unique, and some may overwhelm local resources. In such cases, it may be necessary to call on outside agencies for assistance. Nothing in this policy restricts ACSO from requesting help from allied agency partners, state, county, or local or from those partners deploying their resources during critical incidents. These**

**agencies should operate under their own Military Equipment Use policies, approved by their respective Governing Bodies, and remain responsible for their compliance.**

- b. When ACSO Receives Mutual Aid: Allied agencies operating in Alameda County should comply with their own Military Equipment Use policies.**
  - c. When ACSO Provides Mutual Aid: ACSO members providing aid outside Alameda County will comply with this General Order and coordinate with the host agency. In cases where policies differ, ACSO members shall follow ACSO policy unless otherwise directed by ACSO command.**
  - d. Use of Non-ACSO Equipment: If ACSO members operate military equipment not possessed by ACSO during a mutual aid event, they shall follow ACSO's policies and report such use in the Annual Military Equipment Report.**
5. Using any new or existing military equipment for purposes, in a manner, or by persons not previously approved by the **Governing Body** pursuant to this Order.
  6. Soliciting or responding to proposals for, or entering into an agreement with, any other person or entity to seek funds for, apply to receive, acquire, use, or collaborate in the use of, military equipment.
  7. Acquiring military equipment through any means not provided in above sections 1-6. This includes acquiring military equipment through the various government surplus property programs (refer to G.O. 2.21.01).
  8. The approval process will be implemented for all military equipment obtained on or after January 1, 2022. No later than May 1, 2022, the ACSO shall commence a **Governing Body** approval process in accordance with this section, if ACSO seeks to continue the use of any military equipment that was acquired prior to January 1, 2022. If the **Governing Body** does not approve the continued use of a type of military equipment, the ACSO must not use the equipment beyond 180 days following the **Governing Body's** decision, absent a later approval.
  9. All military equipment authorized for use by the **Governing Body** may be operated by any ACSO member who is properly qualified and trained.
  - 10. The use of military equipment in training exercises, joint operations, or demonstrations conducted by ACSO alone or with other agencies, does not require prior approval from the Governing Body if the equipment and intended training use are already authorized in the current ACSO Military Equipment Use Policy.**
- B. The process for requesting a new military equipment item is as follows:
1. The member requesting the new military equipment item will complete a Military Equipment Request Form, filling out all applicable sections and obtaining approval from their Division Commander.
  2. The completed Military Equipment Request Form will be submitted to the Military

Equipment Coordinator.

3. The Military Equipment Coordinator will upload the Military Equipment Request Form to the Agency's website at least 30 days prior to presenting the request to the **Governing Body**.
  4. The Military Equipment Coordinator will arrange for the **Governing Body** to review the Military Equipment Request for approval through a Board Letter process.
  5. Once the Military Equipment Request is approved or denied, the Military Equipment Coordinator will notify the Agency member who made the request and the approving Division Commander of the **Governing Body**'s decision.
  6. If approved, the new Military Equipment item will be added to the ACSO Military Equipment Inventory and uploaded to PowerDMS by the Planning & Research Unit.
- C. In seeking the approval from the **Governing Body**, the ACSO shall submit a proposed Military Equipment Use G.O. as it pertains to the requested military equipment to the **Governing Body** and make those documents available on the ACSO's website at least 30 days prior to any public hearing concerning the military equipment at issue.
1. Any proposed or final Military Equipment Use G.O. shall be made publicly available on the ACSO's website for as long as the military equipment is available for use.
- D. The ACSO will provide the **Governing Body** with a detailed list of military equipment during the approval/requesting process (use attached Military Equipment Request form), including:
1. A description of each type of military equipment, the quantity sought, its capabilities, expected lifespan, and product description from the manufacturer.
  2. The purposes and authorized uses for which the ACSO proposes to use each piece of military equipment.
  3. The fiscal impact for each piece of military equipment, including the initial cost of obtaining the military equipment and the estimated annual cost for use and maintenance of the equipment.
  4. The legal and procedural rules that govern each authorized use.
  5. Required training for the use of each piece of military equipment, including any course required by POST that must be completed prior to any piece of military equipment being used.
  6. The mechanisms to ensure compliance with this order are well-defined and outlined in the related General Orders and written directives referenced on page 1. The ACSO is responsible to ensure compliance and establishing legally enforceable sanctions for violations where applicable. The Alameda **County Governing Body** is responsible for overseeing the ACSO's use of military equipment and ensuring compliance.
  7. The procedures by which members of the public may register complaints or concerns or submit questions about the use of each specific type of military equipment, and how the

law enforcement agency will ensure that each complaint, concern, or question receives a response in a timely manner (See section.G.4 and G.5 below).

- E. Annual Reporting: The ACSO shall submit an Annual Military Equipment Report to the **Governing Body** for each type of military equipment **approved by the Governing Body**. This annual report shall be the responsibility of the Military Equipment Coordinator and shall be submitted within one calendar year of the previous Annual Military Equipment Report.
1. The Annual Military Equipment Report shall be publicly available on the ACSO website for as long as the military equipment is available for use.
  2. The Annual Military Equipment Report shall, at minimum, include the following information for the immediately preceding calendar year for each type of military equipment:
    - a. A summary of how the military equipment was used and the purpose of its use.
    - b. A summary of any complaints or concerns received concerning the military equipment.
    - c. The results of any internal audits, any information about violations of the Military Equipment Use G.O., and any actions taken in response.
    - d. The total annual cost for each type of military equipment, including acquisition, personnel, training, transportation, maintenance, storage, upgrade, and other ongoing costs, and from what source funds will be provided for the military equipment in the calendar year following submission of the Annual Military Equipment Report.
    - e. The quantity possessed for each type of military equipment.
    - f. If the ACSO intends to acquire additional military equipment in the next year, the quantity sought for each type of military equipment.
  3. Within 30 days of submitting and publicly releasing an Annual Military Equipment Report, the ACSO shall hold at least one well-publicized and conveniently located community engagement meeting, at which the general public may discuss and ask questions regarding the Annual Military Equipment Report and the ACSO's funding, acquisition, possession, or use of military equipment.
- F. If the **Governing Body** does not approve the continuing use of military equipment, within 180 days of submission of the military equipment request to the **Governing Body**, the ACSO shall cease its use of the military equipment no later than the 180<sup>th</sup> day, until it receives the **approval of the Governing Body** in accordance with this order.
- G. Maintenance/Inventory of Military Equipment Supply Levels: When stocks of approved military equipment have reached critically low levels, or have been exhausted, the ACSO may order up to the previously authorized capacity without the approval of the **Governing Body** to maintain essential availability for ACSO needs.

***In the event of an emergency or an unanticipated exhaustion or reduction in stock of the approved ammunition, flash-bangs, or chemical agents, the ACSO may acquire or replenish up to the previously authorized level without prior approval from the Governing Body. Such acquisitions shall be documented and included in the next Annual Military Equipment Report.***

1. Unit Commanders are responsible for maintaining a current inventory of all approved military equipment within their unit, pursuant to G.O. 2.29 – Fiscal Management.

H. Compliance:

1. Any ACSO member who uses any piece of military equipment shall do so for official law enforcement purposes only, in compliance with all ACSO written directives and State and Federal laws, and in a manner that respects the privacy of our community. The ACSO written directives governing the use and training of military equipment include, but are not limited to:
  - a. G.O. 1.05 – Use of Force
  - b. G.O. 1.08 – Annual Weapons Proficiency Training and Re-Qualification
  - c. G.O. 1.21 – Less Lethal Weapons Systems
  - d. G.O. 2.45 – AR-15 Semi-Automatic Rifle Deployment
  - e. G.O. 5.07 – Special Operations Group
  - f. G.O. 5.30 – Operation of Agency Emergency Vehicles
  - g. G.O. 6.15 – Small Unmanned Aircraft System (sUAS)
  - h. G.O. 6.16 – Special Purpose Vehicles and Animals
  - i. OES P&P 4.01 – Mobile Command Center
  - j. Special Response Unit (SRU) Policy & Procedure (P&P) 3.02 – Specialized Weapons, Equipment, Munitions and Chemical Agents
  - k. SRU P&P 3.03 – Tactical Response Vehicles
  - l. SRU P&P 3.04 – Long Range Acoustical Device (LRAD)
  - m. POST SWAT Guidelines (recommendations, not mandates)
  - n. National Tactical Officers Association Tactical Response and Operations Standard for Law Enforcement Agencies (recommendations, not mandates)
  - o. FAA Regulation 14 CFR Part 107 – sUAS Operations
  - p. ACSO sUAS Operations Manual

- q. The ACSO will comply with Assembly Bill 48 and PC 13652 when responding to assemblies, protests, demonstrations, or any other crowd management situations.
  - r. PC 835a – Objectively Reasonable Force to Effect Arrest; Use of Deadly Force
2. ACSO members who violate this general order may be subject to progressive discipline as set forth in G.O. 3.07.01 – Commendations and Discipline and G.O. 3.07.02 – Internal Affairs Complaints and Investigations. All instances of non-compliance will be reported to the **Governing Body** via the Annual Military Equipment Report.
  3. The responsibilities of the Military Equipment Coordinator, or their designee, include, but are not limited to:
    - a. Acting as a liaison to the **Governing Body** for matters related to the requirements of this Order.
    - b. Identifying equipment that qualifies as military equipment which the ACSO intends to acquire and that requires approval by the **Governing Body**.
    - c. Conducting an inventory of all military equipment, at least annually, and submitting the Annual Military Equipment Report, as documented in section E. of this order and in accordance with G.C. 7072.
    - d. Collaborating with any allied agency that may use military equipment within the jurisdiction of the ACSO (G.C. 7071).
    - e. Preparing for, scheduling, and coordinating the annual community engagement meeting (G.C. 7072(b)), which includes:
      - i. Publicizing the details of the meeting.
      - ii. Preparing for public questions regarding the ACSO's funding, acquisition, and use of the military equipment.
    - f. Monitoring the [acso-mil-equip@acgov.org](mailto:acso-mil-equip@acgov.org) email address and ensuring timely responses.
  4. Any member of the public can register a question or concern regarding the ACSO's use of military equipment by emailing [acso-mil-equip@acgov.org](mailto:acso-mil-equip@acgov.org). This email address will be monitored by the Military Equipment Coordinator, or their designee. The ACSO will respond to inquiries in a timely manner. This email address is designated solely for questions or concerns related to the use of military equipment. For all other inquiries related to the ACSO, the public should refer to the ACSO's website at **[www.alamedasheriff.gov](http://www.alamedasheriff.gov)**.

## **Category 1 – Unmanned, remotely piloted, powered aerial or ground vehicles**

### **1. Small Unmanned Aircraft System (sUAS)**

Consists of the small, unmanned aircraft weighing under 55 pounds, the command system, a secure control link, and other related safety support equipment. All sUAS devices have video recording capabilities.

#### **a. Description/Capabilities, Quantity, and Cost**

i. **BRINC LEMUR 2:**

Manufactured in the United States of America and is an advanced commercial-grade UAS specifically designed for interior use. Its battery technology allows for best-in-class flight time and its carbon fiber reinforced propeller ducts enable the UAS to bounce off walls and push open doors. If the UAS collides with an object and ends up on its back, it can flip itself over and relaunch to finish the mission. The controller facilitates two-way conversation between first responders and people they need to help through a set of two ultra-sensitive microphones and a small lightweight loudspeaker.

Quantity: 12

Cost: \$15,000 per unit

ii. **DJI AVATA 2:**

An uncrewed aerial system works as an excellent tool for indoor use. The Avata 2 is smaller, lighter, much more maneuverable, and sports a cinewhoop design where propeller guards are built into the UAS's airframe. The UAS can perform front/back flips, left/right rolls, has an ultra- wide-angle camera, films 4K/60fps HDR videos and has 23 minutes flight time.

iii. **DJI FPV COMBO:**

First-person view UAS with 4K camera, S Flight Mode, super-wide 150-degree field of view, HD low latency transmission and emergency brake. This UAS can record 4K/60FPS video at up to 120Mbps.

iv. **DJI MATRICE 210 V2:**

The updated version of the DJI Mavic 2 Enterprise Line. This UAS uses a 48MP camera, films 4K/60fps and 4K/30fps HDR videos. **b. Purpose and Authorized Use**

To be deployed when its view would assist Agency members with the following situations, including, but not limited to:

- i. Post-incident crime scene preservation and documentation
- ii. Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) missions
- iii. Response to hazardous materials spills
- iv. Search and Rescue (SAR) missions as defined in California Government Code Section 26614.
- v. Public safety and life preservation missions to include barricaded suspects, hostage situations, active shooters, apprehension of armed and dangerous and/or violent fleeing suspects, and high-risk search warrants.
- vi. Disaster response and recovery to include natural or human caused disasters including a full overview of a disaster area for post incident analysis and documentation.
- vii. Training missions
- viii. In response to specific requests from local, state, or federal fire authorities for fire response and prevention
- ix. When there is probable cause to believe that (1) the sUAS will record images of a place, thing, condition, or event; and (2) that those images would be relevant in proving that a certain felony had occurred or is occurring, or that a particular person committed or is committing a certain felony and use of the sUAS does not infringe upon the reasonable expectation of privacy.
- x. Pursuant to a search warrant
- xi. Any official law enforcement mission or event approved by the Sheriff, or the Sheriff's Designee

All flights are documented on a mission dispatch form designed for that purpose and all flight time shall be accounted for on the form. The reason for the flight and type of mission as specified above and name of the supervisor approving the operation will also be documented. Prior to each sUAS flight, a Notice to Airmen (NOTAM) will be filed with the FAA. sUAS Commanders, operators, and observers will consider the protection of individual civil rights and the reasonable expectation of privacy as a key component of any decision made to deploy the sUAS. An sUAS operation requires a Certificate of Authorization (COA) from the FAA. Per G.O. 6.15 the sUAS will not be equipped with any weapons.

**c. Expected Life Span**

All sUAS have an expected life span of 3-5 years.

**d. Fiscal Impact**

There is no anticipated annual maintenance cost. Over the three-to-five-year life span of the unit's operation, there is battery replacement cost of approximately \$400 per in-service sUAS.

**e. Training**

All Agency sUAS operators are certified in the operation of sUAS by successful completion of an approved training course. The pilot must meet standards required by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and obtain an FAA Part 107 (Remote Pilot) license.

**2. Robots**

Unmanned machines operating on the ground and utilized to enhance the safety of the community and Agency members.

**a. Description/Capabilities, Quantity, and Cost**

**i. REMOTEC ANDROS BOMB DISPOSAL ROBOT:**

The REMOTEC Andros F6 robot has dual mobility capability with quick release pneumatic wheels for rapid width reduction and articulating track to traverse rough terrain. The manipulator arm has 7 degrees of freedom to ensure optimum dexterity. The grip rotation is continuous 360 degrees, the torso rotation +/- 90 degrees. It has onboard cameras with one full 360 PTZ.

Quantity: 2

Cost: \$260,486.69 per unit

**ii. TALON EOD ROBOT STANDARD SYSTEM:**

The Talon robot system features modular design which measures 34 inches long, 22.5 inches wide and 10.98 inches high when arm-stowed while the ground clearance is 2.7 inches. It can carry a payload of 100 pounds and has a drag capacity of up to 170 pounds with gripper, a tow capacity of 749 pounds and a maximum arm lift capacity of 20 pounds. TALON features a disruptor-ready manipulator arm, 360° rotating wrist, gripper, microphone, and a loudspeaker.

iii. TALON CBRNE RESPONSE ROBOT:

The Talon robot system features modular design which measures 34 inches long, 22.5 inches wide and 10.98 inches high when arm-stowed while the ground clearance is 2.7 inches. It can carry a payload of 100 pounds and has a drag capacity of up to 170 pounds with gripper, a tow capacity of 749 pounds and a maximum arm lift capacity of 20 pounds. TALON features a disruptor-ready manipulator arm, 360° rotating wrist, gripper, microphone, and a loudspeaker. The robot can be configured with a number of sensors to detect gas, chemical, radiation and temperature in HAZMAT duties.

iv. FOSTER MILLER DRAGON RUNNER:

The Dragon Runner is a small and lightweight robot designed to provide situational awareness, safety and support for reconnaissance, security, inspection and IED missions. The robot has 4 onboard day/night cameras and can lift up to 10 pounds.

Quantity: 1

Cost: \$119,069.85 per unit

v. ICOR CALIBER T5:

The ICOR Caliber T5 is a robot designed for Explosive Ordnance Disposal tasks. The robot is controlled with a command-and-control unit. There is a data and video radio frequency wireless systems, two-way communication with transmitter and receivers with push to talk functionality, a pan-tilt-zoom color camera, and front and rear drive color CCD cameras so that you can get feedback from the robot. The robot will lift, up to 45 lbs. with the arm retracted and 18 lbs. with the arm extended. It has a 360° rotating robotic claw with camera on telescoping arm. It can mount a single recoilless disruptor and function the disruptor with 4 isolated circuits.

Quantity: 4

Cost: \$158,230.46 per unit

vi. ICOR MINI CALIBER:

A lightweight, modular, one-person portable SWAT robot with audio/video capabilities. Two-way communication (talk/listen) with omnidirectional microphone and PTT (Push to Talk) functionality. 360-degree rotating robotic claw with wide angle camera and the ability to climb stairs and clear obstacles.

Quantity: 2

Cost: \$51,000 per unit

b. Purpose and Authorized Use

Electronic robots are an extension of law enforcement officers. They allow the robot to be a communication platform in de-escalation attempts as well as place a machine in high-risk environments in lieu of an Agency member. The use and integration of electronics, like robots, is supported as a national law enforcement best practice. They allow for standoff, safety, and communication to effectively evolve law enforcement into the 21<sup>st</sup> century. The authorized uses of robots include inspecting explosives and suspicious packages, safely communicating with individuals in high threat areas, and visually searching areas for hostages, victims, suspects, or other threats facing the community.

c. Expected Life Span

All robots have an expected life span of 8-10 years.

**d. Fiscal Impact**

Annual maintenance and battery replacement cost is approximately \$2,500 per robot.

**e. Training**

Training for all EOD members shall be developed, approved, or presented only as set forth in G.O. 3.01, which includes basic instruction in the identification, handling, and render safe procedures for improvised explosive devices provided by the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI). Ongoing mandated Agency EOD in-service training for proficiency is required. An FBI refresher course is recommended every 3 years.

## **Category 2 – Armored Personnel Carriers**

Commercially produced wheeled armored personnel vehicles utilized for law enforcement purposes.

**a. Description/Capabilities, Quantity, and Cost**

i. ARMORED GROUP BALLISTIC ARMORED TACTICAL TRANSPORT (BATT), MODEL BATT-S W/ ARMORED PIERCING PACKAGE:

An armored vehicle that seats 12-14 personnel with open floor plan that allows for rescue of down personnel. It can stop various projectiles, which provides greater safety to citizens and Agency members beyond the protection level of shield and personal body armor.

Quantity: 1

Cost: \$154,870 per unit

ii. ARMORED GROUP BALLISTIC ARMORED TACTICAL TRANSPORT (BATT), MODEL BATT-S W/ ARMORED PIERCING PACKAGE:

An armored vehicle that seats 5 personnel with an EOD command post floor plan that allows bomb technicians to operate with the benefit of ballistic protection. It can stop various projectiles, which provides greater safety to citizens and Agency members beyond the protection level of shield and personal body armor.

Quantity: 1

Cost: \$230,535 per unit

iii. 2013 Lenco Bearcat:

An armored vehicle that seats 12-14 personnel with open floor plan that allows for rescue of down personnel. It can stop various projectiles, which provides greater safety to citizens and Agency members beyond the protection level of shield and personal body armor.

The operator must have completed the familiarization training and be proficient in operating and troubleshooting the generator, satellite system, telephones, computers, external lighting, television monitors, camera, computers, and radios.

## **Category 12 – Diversionary Devices and Chemical Agents**

### **1. Chemical Agents and Smoke Canisters**

Canisters that contain chemical agents or smoke that are released into the air when deployed.

**a. Description/Capabilities, Quantity, and Cost**

**PURPOSE:** To establish a procedure for assigning, deployment and maintenance of Agency owned and authorized personally owned AR-15 semi-automatic rifles.

**POLICY:** AR-15 semi-automatic rifles may be deployed by trained personnel when specific conditions or circumstances exist, which may be beyond the capabilities of the Agency standard issued handguns or shotguns to effectively manage a lethal force or critical incident.

**DEFINITIONS:**

**AR-15 RIFLE:** A gas operated, magazine fed, semi-automatic rifle capable of firing a .223 or 5.56 x 45mm caliber projectile.

**MAGAZINE:** A container which stores rounds of ammunition and can be inserted into the weapon's magazine well.

**AMMUNITION:** A self-contained casing which includes a projectile, gunpowder and a primer cap, which can be loaded into a weapon and the projectile, can be propelled by the explosive force of the gunpowder.

**THREE STEP SAFETY CHECK:** A firearms safety check to determine the condition of a firearm which includes the following:

1. Mechanical check
2. Visual check
3. Physical check

**SERIOUS BODILY INJURY:** A physical injury that creates a substantial risk of death, causes serious permanent disfigurement, or may result in long-term loss or impairment of the functioning of any body part or organ.

**LETHAL FORCE:** Lethal force is that force likely to cause serious bodily injury or death.

**PROCEDURE:** The AR-15 may be deployed and utilized under specific conditions and circumstances when a potential lethal threat has been identified and personnel require the capability of an AR-15 to overcome the threat.

A. ISSUING THE AR-15:

1. Only personnel who have completed Agency authorized training in the use/handling/firing of the AR-15 may be assigned to carry and utilize the weapon.
2. Patrol supervisors shall assign an adequate number of trained personnel an AR-15 during their work shift. If possible, a minimum of one AR-15 will be assigned to personnel working in each patrol sector.
3. Supervisors who assign personnel an AR-15 shall complete the Equipment Inventory Log. Personnel assigned an AR-15 must return it to the secured equipment room or armory with all related equipment at the end of their work shift.
4. The Lieutenant of Investigations may authorize a detective to have an AR-15 permanently assigned to them if the detective has received the proper training and there are more than enough AR-15 rifles for uniformed patrol personnel to use. AR-15 rifles assigned to detectives shall be store in accordance with the Agency's written directives.
5. At the start of each work shift, personnel assigned an AR-15 shall complete a three step safety check, ensure the weapon is clean and in good working order. Discrepancies that cannot be resolved shall be reported to the supervisor who assigned the weapon.
6. Personnel assigned an AR-15 will keep the weapon in the provided carrying case for transport to and from their vehicle. The encased AR-15 shall be locked in the trunk of the vehicle, in the locking rifle rack in the cab of the vehicle if provided, or in the agency issued locked container as defined in General Order 2.16.

B. DEPLOYING THE AR-15:

1. All personnel who have been assigned an AR-15 rifle must comply with Sheriff's Office General Order 1.05 "Use of Force."
2. Whenever possible personnel shall obtain permission from a Patrol Supervisor or on scene Tactical Supervisor prior to deploying an AR-15. During circumstances and incidents where, in the deputy's opinion, immediate use of the AR-15 is crucial to prevent immediate loss of life or prevent serious physical injury deputies are authorized to use the AR-15 without prior approval, subject to the provisions of this General Order.
3. Situations and conditions which may require deployment of the AR-15 include but are not limited to:
  - a. Barricaded suspect(s)
  - b. Felony warrant service
  - c. VIP protection

- d. Sniper situations
  - e. High risk undercover operations
  - f. Armed suspects
  - g. Shots fired on-scene prior to or during police response
  - h. Hostage situations
  - i. Acts or threats of violence against hostages, victims and/or deputies
  - j. Attempts to apprehend a suspect(s) armed with a weapon(s)
  - k. Active Shooter Incidents
4. Circumstances which shall be considered prior to the use of the AR-15 include, but are not limited to:
- a. Distance to the potential target(s)
  - b. Area population and/or congested surroundings
  - c. Field of fire and background of potential target(s)
  - d. Effective range and potential penetration of a .223 caliber projectile
- C. ESTABLISHING A PERIMETER: Personnel responding to critical incidents, where the AR-15 has been deployed, should position themselves in the safest location, considering cover/concealment and the apprehension of suspects.
1. Personnel will establish a perimeter around the critical incident area.
  2. The perimeter should be managed by an on-scene supervisor.
  3. The perimeter should be set in a manner which provides cover in case of an exchange of gunfire.
- D. SPECIAL OPERATIONS UNITS: If special operations units such as SRU or EOD are summoned to the scene, personnel with AR-15s shall be assigned to specific duties by the Watch/Incident Commander.
- E. WATCH COMMANDER NOTIFICATION: The Watch Commander shall be notified immediately when a deputy deploys the AR-15.
1. The location and type of incident shall be reported to the Watch Commander.
  2. The Watch Commander shall make appropriate notifications, depending upon the nature of the incident.
  3. In the event of a firearm discharge, the Watch Commander shall ensure that the

provisions of Sheriff's Office General Order 1.02 are followed.


F. AUTHORIZED AR-15 RIFLES AND EQUIPMENT:

1. Authorized magazines shall include only twenty and thirty round capacity.
2. Authorized ammunition is Speer Gold Dot .223 caliber 75 grain soft point or equivalent which has been factory loaded and issued by the RTC.
3. Approved list of AR-15 rifles
  - a. Armalite
  - b. Bushmaster
  - c. Colt
  - d. Knight's Armament
  - e. Lewis Machine and Tool (LMT)
  - f. Noveske Rifleworks
  - g. Rock River Arms
  - h. Smith & Wesson
  - i. LWRC International
  - i. The Sheriff may authorize an exception to the above list if a member personally owns an AR-15 rifle that meets Agency standards for use on duty.

G. TRAINING:

1. All personnel requesting authorization to be assigned an AR-15 must have completed the sixteen-hour Alameda County Sheriff's Office AR-15 training course or an equivalent POST certified training course authorized by the Regional Training Center.
2. Personnel must complete a re-certification course within twelve months of the original Basic Patrol Rifle Operators Course and once each year thereafter.

H. DISCHARGE OF AR-15: All reports associated with incidents involving discharge of an AR-15 shall comply with the Sheriff's Office General Orders 1.01, 1.02 and 1.05.

**PURPOSE:** To provide sworn Agency members with guidelines for the reasonable use of force. While there is no way to specify the exact amount of force to be applied to any given situation, every Agency member is expected to follow these guidelines in order to make such decisions in a reasonable manner.

**POLICY:** It is the policy of the Alameda County Sheriff's Office (ACSO) that Agency members hold the highest regard for the dignity and liberty of all persons. Agency members shall use only that force which is objectively necessary and reasonable, given the facts and circumstances known at the time of the event, and only in a manner that is fair and unbiased. Sworn Agency members should attempt to de-escalate conflicts when and if reasonable. In all situations where force is used, sworn Agency members shall conduct themselves in accordance with lawful constitutional standards and this Agency's written directives.

**DUTY TO INTERCEDE:** Any sworn Agency member who observes another sworn Agency member using force, which is clearly beyond what is objectively reasonable under the circumstances shall, when able, intercede to prevent the use of unreasonable force. Appropriate action may include verbal or physical intervention. These observations must immediately be reported to a supervisor. Any sworn Agency member who fails to intercede will be subject to discipline up to and including the same discipline as the Agency member who used excessive force.

Agency members are prohibited from retaliating against other Agency members that report violations of law or regulation of another Agency member to a supervisor.

**CONSTANT RE-EVALUATION:** Sworn Agency members must use the force option(s) appropriate for the situation as conditions may change rapidly. Sworn Agency members must continually reevaluate the subject's actions and the practical considerations involved in the situation and must be prepared to transition as needed to the appropriate force options (deescalate or escalate), so as to always remain within the bounds of conduct which is objectively reasonable and necessary under the circumstances.

**DEFINITIONS:**

**REPORTABLE FORCE:** The application of physical techniques or tactics, chemical agents, or weapons to another person. It shall not be considered a reportable use of force when a person allows him/herself to be searched, escorted, handcuffed, restrained, or lifted or carried while offering no resistance.

**DE-ESCALATION:** De-escalation is the process of using strategies and techniques intended to decrease the intensity of any situation and increase the likelihood of voluntary compliance. This will be accomplished when safe and without compromising law enforcement priorities.

**IMMINENT:** A threat of death or Great/Serious Bodily Injury (GBI) is "imminent" when, based on the totality of the circumstances, a reasonable officer in the same situation would believe that a person has the present ability, opportunity, and apparent intent to immediately cause death or serious bodily injury to the peace officer or another person. Imminent harm is not merely a fear of future harm, no matter how great the fear and no matter how great the likelihood of the harm, but is one that, from appearance, must be instantly confronted and addressed.

**TOTALITY OF CIRCUMSTANCES:** All facts known to the peace officer at the time, including the conduct of the officer and the subject leading up to any use of force.

**INTERCEDE:** Per Government Code (GC) 7286(a)(4), Intercede includes, but is not limited to, physically stopping the excessive use of force, recording the use of force, if equipped with a Body Worn Camera (BWC), and documenting efforts to intervene, efforts to deescalate the officer's excessive use of force, and confronting the offending officer about the excessive use of force during the use of force and, if the officer continues, reporting to dispatch or the watch commander on duty, and stating the offending officer's name, unit, location, time, and situation, in order to establish a duty for that officer to intervene.

**RETALIATION:** includes but is not limited to, demotion, failure to promote to a higher position when warranted by merit, denial of access to training and professional development opportunities, denial of access to resources necessary for an officer to properly perform their duties, or intimidation, harassment, or the threat of injury while on duty or off duty.

**ORDER:** When the use of force is objectively reasonable and necessary, Agency members shall be guided by the options set forth in this order.

**A. LEGAL AUTHORITY THAT GOVERNS THE USE OF FORCE:**

Sworn Agency members are to follow all legal authority and standards in the application of force when dealing with arrestees or detainees. Provisions in the California Penal Code (PC) and case law decisions allow for sworn Agency members to use force by employing objectively reasonable and necessary standards in accordance with federal and statutory laws.

1. California Penal Code Section 835 - Method of Arrest
2. California Penal Code Section 835a - Effecting Arrest; Resistance
3. Graham v. Connor (490 U.S. 386 [1989]) –Reasonableness
4. Forrester v. City of San Diego

## 5. Tennessee v. Garner (471 U.S. 1 [1985]) –Fleeing Felon

## B. FACTORS TO DETERMINE USE OF FORCE OPTIONS

1. The ACSO recognizes sworn Agency members are expected to make quick decisions during their duties. Several factors should be taken into consideration when determining the reasonable and necessary application of force, as time and circumstances permit. These factors include, but are not limited to:

- a. If a subject poses an imminent threat to sworn Agency members or others
- b. The conduct and behavior of the encountered subject(s), as reasonably perceived by sworn Agency members at contact
- c. If the subject displays symptoms of being under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs
- d. The subject's perceived mental state or capacity
- e. Seriousness of offense
- f. The degree to which the subject has been effectively restrained
- g. If the subject resists, attempts to evade by flight, or is attacking or fighting sworn Agency members or others
- h. If the subject's escape poses a reasonable consequence of danger or threat to sworn Agency members or others
- i. The apparent need for immediate control of the subject to resolve the ongoing and potentially volatile situation
- j. Use of de-escalation techniques
- k. Member/subject factors (age, size, relative strength, skill level, injury, exhaustion, fatigue, number of sworn staff vs. number of subjects)
- l. Training and experience of the sworn Agency members involved
- m. Potential of injury to sworn Agency members, the subject, and others
- n. The subject's proximity to weapons and dangerous items or devices
- o. Prior contacts with the subject, information provided by Sheriff's Dispatch, other Agency members, or awareness of the subject's propensity for violence
- p. Any other exigent circumstances

## C. POINTING OF A FIREARM:

1. The pointing of a firearm alone is not considered a use of force.

2. Nothing in this order shall preclude an Agency member from drawing a firearm when the Agency member reasonably believes it necessary for the safety of others or the Agency member's own safety.

D. CATEGORIES OF ACTION DISPLAYED BY THE SUBJECT:

The subject's actions and the practical considerations involved in a situation are major factors in determining the type of force the Agency member may lawfully use in order to gain or maintain control of the subject or the situation.

1. COMPLIANT:

When a subject offers no resistance, force shall not be used. Non-resistant application of handcuffs, waist restraints, leg irons, and any approved restraint device, in and of itself, is not considered force. Sworn Agency members are able to move a subject with a firm grip or use of an escort position so long as the subject DOES NOT physically resist.

2. PASSIVE NON-COMPLIANT:

A reasonable amount of force may be used when a subject does not respond to verbal commands but offers minimal resistance. Such force includes the use of control holds or grappling designed to hold a subject down utilizing ground control techniques. takedown techniques, pressure point applications, and joint manipulation are also options available to sworn Agency members dealing with a passive non-compliant individual.

It is understood that sworn Agency members may need to lift or carry a passive non-compliant subject(s) during the course of their duties (i.e. place a subject on a gurney or assist a handcuffed subject to their feet). These situations, in and of themselves, should not be considered a reportable use of force. However, these situations should be evaluated based upon the totality of the circumstances.

A subject may not be considered passive non-compliant if it is reasonable to believe, based on the totality of the circumstances, he/she is concealing himself/herself for the purpose of gaining a strategic advantage to ambush/attack others, other first responders, or sworn Agency members, and/or for the purpose of evading capture.

3. ACTIVELY RESISTANT:

A reasonable amount of force may be used when a subject displays physically evasive movement to defeat a sworn Agency member's attempt at control, including bracing, tensing, pulling away, running away, or verbally or physically signaling an intention to avoid or prevent being taken into or retained in custody. Possible force options include the use of control holds, and personal body weapons as a means of gaining compliance, control, or an advantage over a subject.

Personal body weapons shall not be used to strike a subject who is handcuffed or otherwise securely restrained unless the subject actively resists and poses a direct threat as to require such force to prevent harm to civilians, sworn Agency members or

in order to prevent escape.

Use of an Agency approved Canine (General Order (GO) 5.34), Less Lethal Weapon Systems (GO 1.21), including Chemical Agents, may be used to gain compliance from subjects, following a violation of/suspected violation of a felony, or violent misdemeanor, when it is believed, based on the totality of the circumstances, they are concealing themselves for the purpose of gaining a strategic advantage to ambush/attack others, other first responders, or Agency members, and/or for the purpose of evading capture.

Prior to utilizing a canine or deploying a less lethal weapon system, including chemical agents, a verbal warning will be given to subjects, giving them an opportunity to submit to an arrest, unless an announcement would be tactically inappropriate or exigent circumstances exist.

Sworn Agency members will wait a reasonable amount of time based on the size and terrain of the location, the ability of the subject to safely surrender before deploying a canine and/or chemical agent(s) unless an exigency arises prior to the reasonable time elapsing. The reasonableness standard, *Graham v. Connor* (1989) 490 US 386, 396-7, shall be applied.

#### 4. ASSAULTIVE:

Intermediate Force: Force which has a significant risk of injury.

A reasonable amount of force may be used when a subject attempts to assault a sworn Agency member or another person, or verbally or physically displays an intention to assault a sworn Agency member or another person. Possible force options include but are not limited to the following:

- a. Use of personal body weapons
- b. Use of Agency Canine: Refer to GO 5.34
- c. Discharge of Conducted Electrical Weapons (CEW): Refer to GO 1.20
- d. Strikes from an agency approved impact weapon, including weapons of opportunity, shall be used in a manner as presented and demonstrated during training. An impact weapon shall not be used to strike a subject who is handcuffed or otherwise securely restrained unless the subject actively resists and poses a direct threat as to require such force to prevent harm to civilians, sworn Agency members or in order to prevent escape.
- e. Agency approved Chemical Agents and Oleoresin Capsicum (OC) Spray shall be used in accordance with agency training and GO 1.21.

The use of a CEW, Oleoresin Capsicum, or any other chemical agents/chemical weapons on a known pregnant/postpartum INMATE is prohibited by law.

Subjects exposed to chemical agents shall be removed from the contaminated area as quickly as possible and have their eyes and face thoroughly flushed with

water as soon as practical. Subjects who have been sprayed with OC Spray shall be frequently monitored during field detention, arrest, and transportation to ensure that they do not experience breathing difficulty. Jail staff will be notified when a subject exposed to Chemical Agents or OC Spray is booked into Santa Rita Jail (SRJ).

- f. The Carotid Restraint, and/or any other control hold(s) where pressure is applied to the neck of a suspect/subject when used as an intermediate level of force is prohibited by law.
- g. Agency members shall refrain from using any technique or transport method that involves a substantial risk of positional asphyxia to a suspect/subject.
  - 1. "Positional asphyxia" means situating a person in a manner that compresses their airway and reduces the ability to sustain adequate breathing. This includes, without limitation, the use of any physical restraint that causes a person's respiratory airway to be compressed or impairs the person's breathing or respiratory capacity, including any action in which pressure or body weight is UNREASONABLY applied against a restrained person's neck, torso, or back, or positioning a restrained person without reasonable monitoring for signs of asphyxia.
  - 2. Agency members shall continue to monitor the subject(s) breathing following any use of force, especially when pressure was applied to a subject's upper torso possibly limiting their ability to breathe. If the subject begins to experience breathing difficulties the Agency member(s) should minimally, and if safe to do so, reposition the subject to a position where they can breathe easier.
  - 3. Agency members shall summon medical services as soon as practical anytime a suspect/subject states they are experiencing breathing difficulties.

During active rapidly evolving incidents Agency members may need to momentarily control a subject's movement/attempts to harm others by applying pressure to the back of a subject's torso or near the head. Agency members shall, as soon as practical, remove any pressure to these areas and re-evaluate a more appropriate use of force, application of restraints, or if applicable no additional force following the successful application of physical restraints and/or gained compliance.

- h. Less Lethal Weapon Systems: Refer to GO 1.21, Less Lethal Weapon systems.

#### 5. LIFE-THREATENING:

Lethal Force: Any use of force that creates a substantial risk of causing death or GBI, including, but not limited to, the discharge of a firearm.

PC 243(f)(4) - "Serious bodily injury": a serious impairment of physical condition, including, but not limited to, the following: loss of consciousness, concussion, bone fracture, protracted loss or impairment of function of any bodily member or organ, a wound requiring extensive suturing, and serious disfigurement.

## a. USE OF LETHAL FORCE DESCRIBED:

1. Lethal force is justified upon another person only when the Agency member taking lethal action reasonably believes, based on the totality of the circumstances, such force is necessary for any of the following reasons:
  - a. As a means of defending another person from death or the imminent threat of death or GBI.
  - b. As a means of defending oneself from death or the imminent threat of death or GBI.
  - c. To apprehend a fleeing person for any felony that threatened or resulted in death or GBI, if the Agency member reasonably believes that the person will cause death or GBI to another unless immediately apprehended. When feasible, Agency members shall, prior to the use of lethal force, make reasonable efforts to identify themselves as a peace officer and warn that deadly force may be used, unless the Agency member has objectively reasonable grounds to believe the person is aware of those facts.
2. Lethal force shall not be used against a person based on the danger that person poses to themselves, if objectively reasonable officers would believe the person does not pose an imminent threat of death or serious bodily injury to another person or the sworn Agency member.
3. In determining whether lethal force is necessary, Agency members shall evaluate each situation in light of the particular circumstances of each case and shall use other available resources and techniques, if reasonably safe and feasible, to an objectively reasonable officer.
4. Lethal force may be used as a means of terminating vicious/dangerous or seriously injured animals when other means of disposal are impractical or unavailable. Prior supervisor approval shall be obtained if time permits.
  - a. If an immediate reaction to the vicious/dangerous animal is necessary, and supervisor approval cannot be obtained prior to lethal force being used, the Agency member shall notify the supervisor as soon as practical following the use of lethal force.
5. When sworn Agency members are engaged in a life-threatening situation, the use of improvised techniques (including techniques that fall outside of Agency training and techniques otherwise prohibited in this order) makeshift weapons or any weapon of opportunity can be justified as lethal force when other options are deemed impractical.
6. Sworn Agency members are prohibited from firing warning shots in the course of performing their law enforcement responsibilities since they may create a substantial risk of harm to innocent bystanders.
7. Agency members shall consider their surroundings and potential risks to

bystanders and other peace officers, to the extent reasonable under the circumstances, before discharging a firearm.

8. Sworn Agency members shall not intentionally place themselves in the path of an oncoming vehicle in order to create an exigency justifying lethal force. If feasible, sworn staff should attempt to move out of the path of any oncoming vehicle attempting to evade or harm them rather than discharge a firearm at its occupants. A sworn Agency member may discharge his/her firearm at an occupant(s) within a moving vehicle who poses an imminent threat of death or GBI to others or the sworn Agency member.

E. CROWD CONTROL:

For crowd control or situations of civil unrest, sworn Agency members will refer to Agency training and direction from the assigned incident commander. Refer to GO 5.04 for special events including crowd control incidents.

1. Pursuant to PC 13652.1(a) Each law enforcement agency shall, within 60 days of each incident, publish a summary on its internet website of all instances in which a peace officer employed by that agency uses a kinetic energy projectile or chemical agent, as those terms are defined in PC 13652, for crowd control. However, an agency may extend that period for another 30 days if they demonstrate just cause, but in no case longer than 90 days from the time of the incident.

F. CRITICAL INCIDENT INVESTIGATIONS:

Critical incidents involving sworn Agency members, while on duty or acting under the color of authority while off-duty, shall be investigated pursuant to GO 1.02.

G. MEDICAL ATTENTION/FIRST AID - ALL LEVELS OF FORCE INCLUDING COMPLIANT:

1. Medical aid shall be summoned as quickly as reasonably possible to any subject who sustains an injury following any law enforcement action; even if no force was used.
2. In the event a sworn Agency member uses force on a subject, a subject sustains visible injuries during apprehension, or if the subject complains of injury:
  - a. The subject shall receive first aid in the field, either by a sworn Agency member if safe to do so, as outlined in his/her first aid training, or by medical personnel called to the scene (paramedics or fire department personnel). If deemed necessary by a sworn Agency member or medical personnel, the subject shall be transported, as soon as possible, to a medical facility for additional medical treatment.
  - b. During field detention, transportation, and custodial restraint situations, subjects shall be positioned so that they do not experience breathing difficulty. This is especially important if a subject has been sprayed with OC and/or is suspected of being under the influence of drugs or alcohol. It is critical to closely monitor subjects who are experiencing breathing difficulty and to get them medical attention as soon as possible.
  - c. If a person subjected to any level of physical force were to lose consciousness, Agency members shall immediately request emergency medical and fire

department personnel to respond and evaluate the condition of the subject.

- d. When force is used on an inmate in a jail facility, they shall be physically examined by the jail facility's medical personnel to ascertain the inmate's well-being and his/her need to receive further medical attention.

#### H. BODY WORN CAMERAS:

Sworn Agency members shall activate their Body Worn Camera (BWC) as outlined in GO 8.17.

#### I. SWORN AGENCY MEMBER REPORTING RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. Any force used by a sworn Agency member shall be reported to a supervisor and documented in a report pursuant to GO 5.50.
2. All sworn Agency members who use force during an incident shall write and submit any applicable reports or supplemental reports.
3. All involved sworn Agency members who used force, and all subjects involved in the use of force, shall be photographed to document any injuries or lack thereof. Every effort shall be taken to document these injuries, or absence of injuries.
4. Photographs and applicable BWC video shall capture as much information about the incident as possible. This includes "close-up" recordings and photographs to specific areas where force was applied, such as hands or areas of impact.
5. All involved sworn Agency members who use force are required to notify the shift supervisor. The shift supervisor is required to respond to all instances where the application of force is used, absent unusual or exigent circumstances. Sworn Agency members are required to document which supervisor was notified and which supervisor responded to the scene.
6. If for some reason sworn Agency members are unable to take particular photographs or capture BWC video of injuries, or lack thereof, reasons explaining the absence of such shall be documented in the report and Blue Team entry.
7. If no force was used by a sworn Agency member(s) but a subject alleges that force was used, an informational report (not a Use of Force report) shall be written documenting the incident. The incident, including the subject's allegations, shall be reported to a supervisor. Digital photographs shall be taken of the subject, and the Agency member, at the time of the allegation as a way of documenting his/her condition.

#### J. SUPERVISORY/MANAGEMENT RESPONSIBILITY TO REVIEW INCIDENT:

1. When a sworn supervisor becomes aware of the use of force, he/she shall:
  - a. Absent unusual or exigent circumstances, supervisors shall respond to the scene of every use of force to evaluate the condition of involved Agency member(s), suspect(s), and the community.

- b. Once on scene, supervisors are required to assess the incident and ensure all involved sworn Agency members submit a written report, as soon as practical, documenting the force that was used. All applicable forms, entries, and pertinent information (e.g., Probable Cause Declaration, electronic Consolidated Arrest Report, etc.) shall be submitted in a timely manner.
- c. The responding supervisor is responsible for initiating a Blue Team entry in a timely manner. During the evaluation process, potential policy violations, training issues, and other supervisory comments and recommendations will be documented in the supervisor's review section. Supervisory comments should assess the level of reasonableness and necessity.

While preparing the Blue Team review, supervisors shall evaluate criminal reports, witness statements, BWC footage, photographs, and any other evidence that sheds light on the use of force incident. At each level of the review process a supervisor shall document whether the use of force was within Agency directives. Blue Team entry will be reviewed through the chain of command and forwarded to the appropriate Division Commander.

#### K. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE REPORTING:

Every month the Planning and Research Unit is responsible for providing the Department of Justice with details regarding all incidents that meet any of the below criteria:

1. An incident involving the shooting of a civilian by a peace officer
2. An incident involving the shooting of a peace officer by a civilian
3. An incident in which the use of force by a peace officer against a civilian resulted in serious bodily injury or death.
4. An incident in which the use of force by a civilian against a peace officer results in serious bodily injury or death.

For the purpose of this reporting (Government Code 12525.2), "serious bodily injury" is defined as bodily injury that involves a substantial risk of death, unconsciousness, protracted or obvious disfigurement, or protracted loss or impairment of the function of a bodily member or organ.

Each supervisor is responsible for reporting any reports falling under the above criteria to Planning and Research as part of the use of force review process. Supervisors are to complete the attached Office of The Attorney General Department of Justice Form (DOJ URSUS Reporting Form) and email it to the Network Infrastructure Security Team at [netsecurity@acgov.org](mailto:netsecurity@acgov.org).

#### L. ADMINISTRATIVE REVIEW FOR INCIDENTS WHICH RESULT IN DEATH OR SERIOUS INJURY:

Refer to GO 1.02.

#### M. USE OF FORCE ANALYSIS/REVIEW:

1. Analytical reports shall be utilized to conduct an annual Use of Force analysis to identify the following:
  - a. Date and time of incidents
  - b. Types of encounters resulting in use of force
  - c. Trends or patterns related to race, age and gender of subjects involved.
  - d. Trends or patterns resulting in injury to any person including Agency members and;
  - e. Any impact these trends or patterns may have on Agency written directives, practices, equipment, and training.
2. The Training Committee will review the annual Use of Force analysis report.
3. A separate review of all assaults on law enforcement officers will be completed annually to determine trends or patterns with recommendations to enhance officer safety, revise written directives, or address training issues.
4. The Regional Training Center (RTC) will generate the annual Use of Force analysis report, annual Assault on Law Enforcement Officer Review, and any Training Committee reports to be forwarded to the Sheriff, via chain of command. ***This report will be generated prior to April 1<sup>st</sup> of each year and will analyze data from the previous calendar year.***

#### N. TRAINING:

1. Sworn members of this Agency shall receive and maintain required Commission on Police Officer Standards and Training certified training on de-escalation/conflict resolution techniques, defensive tactics, less-lethal, and lethal force.
2. The training provided to all Agency members will allow them to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding of Agency written directives related to uses of force. This training may be conducted during Agency firearms training, continued professional training, and during briefings.
3. The training will provide guidelines to all Agency members regarding vulnerable populations, including, but not limited to, children, the elderly, people who are pregnant, and people with physical, mental, and developmental disabilities.
4. If an Agency member receives a substantiated finding for an excessive use of force complaint, they shall be prohibited from serving as a training officer for a minimum of three years following the date of the substantiated finding. Training officer includes:
  - a. Working as a Field Training Officer
  - b. Working as a Jail Training Officer

- c. Working as a Recruit Training Officer
- d. Working in any other training capacity where other law enforcement officers are in attendance.

O. RELEASE OF PUBLIC RECORDS:


- 1. The Agency will remain in compliance with the California Public Records Act and other applicable laws concerning the release of public information, (i.e. PC 832.7 and GO 1.22 – Public Records).

P. PERSONNEL COMPLAINTS FROM CITIZENS:

- 1. A personnel complaint is any charge against an Agency member which, if true, would adversely affect the Agency's operational efficiency or relations with the public. It may be internally or externally generated. Personnel complaints related to use of force incidents, regardless of who is making the complaint, shall be done so in accordance of GO 3.07.02 – Internal Affairs Complaints and Investigations.

Q. USE OF FORCE GENERAL ORDER REVIEW:

- 1. Pursuant to GC 7286(a)(23), this written directive will be reviewed regularly and, when necessary, updates will be completed to reflect developing practices and procedures.

**PURPOSE:** To establish guidelines for the handling and the deployment of less lethal weapons systems and reporting procedures for their use.

**POLICY:** Members of the Alameda County Sheriff's Office (ACSO) who have successfully completed an agency approved, Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) certified course in the proper use and deployment of less lethal weapons systems shall be authorized to use them during the performance of their duties to protect life and property. This order does not replace General Order (GO) 1.20 Conducted Electrical Weapons.

All use of less lethal weapons systems shall be in accordance with General Order 1.05, Use of Force.

**DEFINITIONS:**

**LESS LETHAL WEAPONS SYSTEMS:** Those munitions that can be fired, launched, or otherwise propelled for the purpose of engaging compliance, overcoming resistance, or preventing serious injury without posing a significant potential for causing death. Examples of less lethal weapons systems include foam, rubber batons, rubber pellets, chemical agents, and other like items including thrown or launched canisters containing an ignition fuse similar to a smoke or chemical agent canister or separating submunition.

**LETHAL MUNITIONS:** Those munitions that can be fired from a firearm and derive their stopping ability via penetrating trauma to the body. Use of these munitions usually results in debilitating injury or death of the subject.

**ORDER:** Less lethal weapons systems should be used whenever practical to protect life and restore order. Less lethal weapons systems should be considered whenever the use of less lethal options would assist in effecting an arrest or reducing the risk of more serious injury.

**A. CIRCUMSTANCES JUSTIFYING USE OF LESS LETHAL MUNITIONS**

Circumstances justifying the use of less lethal weapons systems include, but are not limited to:

1. Restoration or maintenance of order during jail disturbances/riots.
2. Safely controlling non-compliant or violent persons.

3. Situations where the first line supervisor or Commanding Officer deem necessary to safely resolve the incident with a lesser potential of serious injury to citizens, the involved subject/suspects, and Agency members.

**B. PROHIBITED USE OF KINETIC ENERGY PROJECTILES AND CHEMICAL AGENTS**

1. Pursuant to PC 13652(a), except as otherwise provided in PC 13652(b), kinetic energy projectiles and chemical agents shall not be used by any law enforcement agency to disperse any peaceful assembly, protest, or demonstration.
2. PC 13652(b): During unlawful and violent protests, kinetic energy projectiles and chemical agents shall only be deployed by a peace officer that has received training on their proper use by Commission on Police Officer Standards and Training (POST). The use of kinetic energy projectiles needs to be objectively reasonable to defend against a threat to life or Great/Serious Bodily Injury (GBI), to any individual, including any peace officer, or to bring an objectively dangerous and unlawful situation safely and effectively under control, and only in accordance with all of the following requirements:
  - a. De-escalation techniques or other alternatives to force have been attempted, when objectively reasonable, and have failed.
  - b. Repeated, audible announcements are made announcing the intent to use kinetic energy projectiles and chemical agents and the type to be used, when objectively reasonable to do so. The announcements shall be made from various locations, if necessary, and delivered in multiple languages, if feasible.
  - c. Persons are given an objectively reasonable opportunity to disperse, based on a Law Enforcement objective, and leave the scene.
  - d. An objectively reasonable effort has been made to identify persons engaged in violent acts and those who are not, and kinetic energy projectiles or chemical agents are targeted toward those individuals engaged in violent acts. Projectiles shall not be aimed indiscriminately into a crowd or group of persons.
  - e. Kinetic energy projectiles and chemical agents are used only with the frequency, intensity, and in a manner that is proportional to the threat and objectively reasonable.
  - f. Officers shall minimize the possible incidental impact of their use of kinetic energy projectiles and chemical agents on bystanders, medical personnel, journalists, or other unintended targets.
  - g. An objectively reasonable effort has been made to extract individuals in distress.
  - h. Medical assistance is promptly provided, if properly trained personnel are present, or procured, for injured persons, when it is reasonable and safe to do so.
  - i. Kinetic energy projectiles shall not be aimed at the head, neck, or any other vital organs.

- j. Kinetic energy projectiles or chemical agents shall not be used by any law enforcement agency solely due to any of the following:
  - i. A violation of an imposed curfew
  - ii. A verbal threat
  - iii. Noncompliance with a law enforcement directive
- k. If the chemical agent to be deployed is tear gas, only a command officer at the scene of the assembly, protest, or demonstration may authorize its use.
- l. Kinetic energy projectiles and chemical agents will be inventoried before and after pre-planned crowd management events. Best efforts will be made to inventory kinetic energy projectiles and chemical agents when responding to violence, major vandalism, theft, or looting.
- m. Under no circumstances shall multiple projectile impact munitions (MPIM) be utilized inside of a Therapeutic Health Unit (THU) at Santa Rita Jail, or against inmates housed in a THU while outside of their assigned housing unit.

#### C. REPORTING PROCEDURES

- 1. All incidents involving the use of less lethal weapons systems shall be reported immediately to a supervisor.
- 2. The use of less lethal weapons constitutes a use of force and must be reported in accordance with the Agency's Use of Force Policy GO 1.05.

#### D. AGENCY REQUIREMENTS FOLLOWING DEPLOYMENT

- 1. Pursuant to PC 13652.1 (a), each law enforcement agency shall, within 60 days of each incident, publish a summary on the agency's internet website of all instances in which a peace officer employed by that agency use a kinetic energy projectile or chemical agent, as those terms are defined in PC 13652, for a crowd control event. However, an agency may extend that period for another 30 days if they demonstrated just cause, but in no case longer than 90 days from the time of the incident.
- 2. For each incident reported under the above PC, the summary shall be limited to that information known to the agency at the time of the report and shall include only the following:
  - a. A description of the assembly, protest, demonstration, or incident, including the approximate crowd size and the number of officers involved.
  - b. The type of kinetic energy projectile or chemical agent deployed.
  - c. The number of rounds or quantity of chemical agent dispersed, as applicable.
  - d. The number of documented injuries as a result of the kinetic energy projectile or chemical agent deployment.
  - e. The justification for using the kinetic energy projectile or chemical agent, including any de-escalation tactics or protocols and other measures that were taken at the

time of the event to deescalate tensions and avoid the necessity of using the kinetic energy projectile or chemical agent.

#### E. STORAGE OF LESS LETHAL WEAPONS SYSTEMS

1. Storage of less lethal weapons systems shall conform to manufacturer's recommendations. Munitions, which have been removed from their original container, shall be clearly and conspicuously identified as less lethal to prevent confusion with lethal munitions.
2. Under no circumstances shall less lethal munitions be kept in a manner, which might lead to confusing them with lethal munitions.
3. 40mm launchers shall be stored in the following manner:
  - a. In a case, in the less lethal weapon system kit. Alternate acceptable storage for the launcher will be in the duty station armory.
  - b. The breech of the launcher will be closed and the chamber empty.
4. The less lethal weapon system kit will consist of:
  - a. One (1) 40mm launcher, **one (1) FN 303 launcher, or one (1) PepperBall launcher.**
  - b. Agency approved chemical or impact munitions.
  - c. Other less lethal munitions and equipment as determined by the facility's Commanding Officer.
  - d. The Commanding Officer, or the Commanding Officer's designee, will be responsible for maintenance and inventory of the less lethal weapon system kit.

#### F. TARGET AREAS

1. Less lethal weapons systems will be aimed at the appropriate suspect target areas based on the circumstances.
2. When engaging a subject/suspect, personnel should evaluate the effectiveness of each round during the volley while constantly re-evaluating the incident as a whole and the subject/suspect's actions or response. Compliance and/or incapacitation are the desired goals, and alternative target areas should be considered when rounds are not effective.
3. Alternative target areas/response considerations will be based on the circumstances the Agency member is observing and responding to.
4. Aiming Points
  - a. Primary Target Areas: Large Muscle Groups
    - i. Buttocks
    - ii. Thighs
    - iii. Calf


- iv. Abdomen
- b. Secondary Target Areas: Skeletal and Medium Muscle Groups
  - i. Wrist
  - ii. Elbows
  - iii. Knees
  - iv. Upper arm
- c. Final Resort Target Area: When a threat escalates to a level where using deadly force is justified to prevent death or serious bodily injury, the following areas may be targeted: *(except during a crowd control event, refer to PC 13652 (b))*.
  - i. Chest (center mass)
  - ii. Groin
  - iii. Spine
  - iv. Lower Back
  - v. Head and Neck

#### G. POTENTIAL FOR CAUSING DEATH OR SERIOUS INJURY

1. The potential for causing death or (GBI) with projectiles is a reality.
2. This potential is greatly reduced when impacts to the head and neck are avoided, and when appropriate medical attention is provided in cases where the subject is struck in an area that might conceal a closed injury, including such areas as the chest, back, thoracic and abdominal cavities and the groin.
  - a. Medical attention shall be sought anytime a less lethal weapons system is deployed and the subject/suspect is detained or apprehended.

#### H. DEPLOYMENT DELIVERY SYSTEMS

Refer to GO 2.21.02 – Military Equipment for a listing of all less lethal munitions/Systems.

**PURPOSE:** To define the criteria for responding to routine and emergency calls, including guidelines for use of emergency equipment, including audible powered sirens during "wide scale" evacuations.

**POLICY:** All Agency members operating emergency vehicles shall, at all times, operate the vehicle with due regard for the safety of all other persons. In addition to provisions of this procedure, vehicle operators shall follow the provisions of the California Vehicle Code (VC) regarding the operation of emergency vehicles, including use of vehicle mounted and powered sirens VC 27002.

**DEFINITIONS:**

CODE 1: Response to non-urgent incidents without undue delay. No combination of emergency lights or siren shall be used and strict compliance with traffic laws and regulations is mandatory.

CODE 3: Response to emergency incidents. Use of emergency lights is mandatory and siren as may be necessary.

**ORDER:**

- A. Unless a "Code 3" response is justified, members will respond to all calls "Code 1."
- B. Agency personnel shall only operate a vehicle "Code 3" when authorized by the Watch Sergeant or Watch Commander.
  1. Any time an Agency member engages in Code 3 operation, the Watch Sergeant/Commander will be immediately advised of the circumstances.
  2. The Watch Sergeant/Commander will immediately consider all factors and determine if Code 3 operation shall continue or terminate. These factors include, but are not limited to:
    - a. Type of call,
    - b. Time of day,

- c. The amount of traffic,
  - d. Safety of the public,
  - e. Driver's experience and abilities,
  - f. Road conditions (type of road, wet, dry),
  - g. Traffic conditions (heavy, moderate, light), and
  - h. Weather conditions (rain, fog, sunny).
3. The driver of the emergency vehicle shall consider the following at all times:
- a. Type of call,
  - b. Time of day,
  - c. Amount of traffic en-route to the destination,
  - d. Safety of the public,
  - e. Road conditions (type of road, wet, dry),
  - f. Traffic conditions (heavy, moderate, light),
  - g. Weather conditions (rain, fog, sunny), and
  - h. Proximity of other Agency members who may be closer resulting in less drive time in a Code 3 manner.
4. Agency members shall be mindful to never jeopardize their own safety, or the safety of the public, while operating Code 3.
- a. When responding Code 3, the Agency member must notify dispatch of the location he/she is responding from.
  - b. When discontinuing the Code 3 response, the Agency member shall immediately advise dispatch he/she has discontinued the Code 3 response.
5. The driver and passengers in any County owned, leased or maintained vehicle shall wear a seat belt whenever the vehicle is operating.
6. Agency personnel shall adhere to the requirements and procedures listed in General Order 5.01, whenever a vehicle pursuit occurs.

C. SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

- 1. CALIFORNIA VEHICLE CODE 21055: Sets forth the legal authority for an emergency vehicle to respond Code 3. Section 21055 exempts the driver of an emergency vehicle from adhering to the rules of the road under any of the following conditions:

- a. If the vehicle is being driven in response to an emergency call,
  - b. While engaged in rescue operations,
  - c. If the vehicle is being used in the immediate pursuit of an actual or suspected law violator, and
  - d. If the driver of the vehicle sounds a siren, as may be reasonably necessary, and the vehicle displays a red lamp visible from the front as a warning to other drivers and pedestrians.
2. CALIFORNIA VEHICLE CODE 21056: Section 21055 does not relieve the driver of a vehicle from the duty to drive with due regard for the safety of all other persons using the highway, nor protect him/her from the consequences of an arbitrary exercise of the privileges granted in that section.
  3. CALIFORNIA VEHICLE CODE 21807: It is the duty of the driver of an authorized emergency vehicle to drive with due regard for the safety of all persons and property.

D. CODE 3 OPERATION IN NEIGHBORING JURISDICTIONS:

1. Personnel operating emergency vehicles in a Code 3 mode, within or through a neighboring jurisdiction's city limits, will notify Dispatch of:
  - a. The route.
  - b. The approximate time of arrival.
2. Dispatch will notify the appropriate jurisdiction. Refer to Interagency Pursuit Guideline, General Order 5.01.

E. USE OF SIREN:

1. All Agency patrol vehicles are equipped with sirens. The sirens that may be utilized during Code 3 driving include, the "Wail" and "Yelp." Some agency vehicles are equipped with the "Hi-Lo" audible siren. The Hi-Lo siren is not permitted for use during normal vehicle operations or during any form of Code 3 driving.
  - a. Pursuant to Senate Bill 909 (2020), law enforcement agencies may use the Hi-Lo siren during wide scale evacuations as result of a natural disaster or other large scale emergency, that requires an evacuation act to take effect immediately. Common or possible large scale emergencies could include but are not limited to:
    - i. Wild fires,
    - ii. Earth quakes, and
    - iii. Flooding, etc.

**ORDINANCE NO. 2024-39**

**AN ORDINANCE RESTATING AND AMENDING TITLE IX, CHAPTER 9.45 OF THE GENERAL  
ORDINANCE CODE CONCERNING THE MILITARY EQUIPMENT USE POLICY**

The Board of Supervisors hereby restates and amends Chapter 9.45 of the County of Alameda General Code of Ordinances and ordains as follows:

**SECTION I**

The Board of Supervisors, County of Alameda, hereby finds:

1. On September 30, 2021, Governor Gavin Newsom signed Assembly Bill 481 (AB 481) into law relating to the use of military equipment by California law enforcement agencies.
2. The California Legislature enacted AB 481 to increase public transparency surrounding how California law enforcement agencies fund, acquire, and/or use military equipment, as defined under AB 481.
3. AB 481 requires California law enforcement agencies to obtain approval of their applicable governing body through the adoption of an ordinance containing a military equipment use policy before taking certain actions relating to the funding, acquisition, and/or use of military equipment.
4. AB 481 also requires California law enforcement agencies that receive approval for a military equipment use policy to submit to the applicable governing body an annual military equipment report for each type of military equipment approved by the governing body within one year of approval, and annually thereafter so long as the military equipment is available for use.
5. AB 481 requires the applicable governing body of each California law enforcement agency to annually review the military equipment use policy to either (a) renew approval of the policy; (b) disapprove a renewal of the authorization of a type of military equipment or (c) amend the military equipment use policy to incorporate new or different military equipment. In making its determinations, the governing body must consider whether each type of military equipment complies with four standards:
  - a. The military equipment is necessary because there is no reasonable alternative that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety
  - b. The proposed military equipment use policy will safeguard the public's welfare, safety, civil rights, and civil liberties
  - c. If purchasing the equipment, the equipment is reasonably cost effective compared to available alternatives that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety
  - d. Prior military equipment use complied with the military equipment use policy that was in effect at the time, or if prior uses did not comply with the accompanying

military equipment use policy, corrective action has been taken to remedy nonconforming uses and ensure future compliance

6. On October 20, 2022, the County of Alameda's Board of Supervisors adopted the County's Military Equipment Use Policy through the adoption of Title IX, Chapter 9.45 of the County's General Ordinance Code.
7. At that time, and each year since that date, the Board of Supervisors has considered each type of military equipment funded, acquired, or used through the lens of the four standards and has found that the military equipment identified has complied with the standards for approval. Upon the effective date of this restatement and amendment this annual review may be accomplished by resolution.

## **SECTION II**

Title IX, Chapter 9.45 of the General Code of Ordinances is restated and amended to read as follows:

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Alameda ordains as follows:

### **Military Equipment, Funding, Acquisition, and Use (AB 481)**

#### **9.45.010 – Title and Purpose**

- A. This Chapter shall be known as the military equipment use ordinance and embodies the military use policy.
- B. The Board of Supervisors hereby declares that the purpose of this Chapter is to establish guidelines and procedures for the acquisition, funding, use, and reporting of "military equipment," as the term is defined in California Government Code 7070. This Chapter fulfills the requirements set forth in Assembly Bill 481 (2021). Requirements include, but are not limited to, seeking approval to procure, possess, and use military equipment, conducting annual reporting, maintaining inventory, and addressing public complaints, concerns, or questions regarding military equipment.

#### **9.45.020 – Policy**

The Board of Supervisors has determined as follows:

- A. Military Equipment is necessary because there is no reasonable alternative that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety.
- B. The proposed military equipment use policy will safeguard the public's welfare, safety, civil rights, and civil liberties.
- C. If purchasing the equipment, the equipment is reasonably cost effective compared to available alternatives that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety.
- D. Prior military equipment use complied with the military equipment use policy that was in effect at the time, or if prior uses did not comply with the accompanying military equipment use policy, corrective action has been taken to remedy nonconforming uses and ensure future compliance.

E. This order excludes military equipment used solely for training or promotional/advertisement purposes.

#### 9.45.030 – Definitions

A. "Military Equipment" includes all of the following, per Cal. Gov. Code § 7070:

1. Unmanned, remotely piloted, powered aerial or ground vehicles.
2. Mine-resistant ambush-protected (MRAP) vehicles or armored personnel carriers. However, police versions of standard consumer vehicles are specifically excluded from this subdivision.
3. High mobility multipurpose wheeled vehicles (HMMWV), commonly referred to as Humvees, two and one-half-ton trucks, five-ton trucks, or wheeled vehicles that have a breaching or entry apparatus attached. However, unarmored all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) and motorized dirt bikes are specifically excluded from this subdivision.
4. Tracked armored vehicles that provide ballistic protection to their occupants and utilize a tracked system instead of wheels for forward motion.
5. Command and control vehicles that are either built or modified to facilitate the operational control and direction of public safety units.
6. Weaponized aircraft, vessels, or vehicles of any kind.
7. Battering rams, slugs, and breaching apparatuses that are explosive in nature. However, items designed to remove a lock, such as bolt cutters, or a handheld ram designed to be operated by one person, are specifically excluded from this subdivision.
8. Firearms of .50 caliber or greater. However, standard issue shotguns are specifically excluded from this subdivision.
9. Ammunition of .50 caliber or greater. However, standard issue shotgun ammunition is specifically excluded from this subdivision.
10. Specialized firearms and ammunition of less than .50 caliber, including assault weapons as defined in Sections 30510 and 30515 of the Penal Code, with the exception of standard issue service weapons and ammunition of less than .50 caliber that are issued to officers, agents, or employees of a law enforcement agency or a state agency.
11. Any firearm or firearm accessory that is designed to launch explosive projectiles.
12. "Flashbang" grenades and explosive breaching tools, "tear gas," and "pepper balls," excluding standard, service-issued handheld pepper spray.
13. Taser Shockwave, microwave weapons, water cannons, and the Long Range Acoustic Device (LRAD).

14. The following projectile launch platforms and their associated munitions: 40mm projectile launchers, "bean bag," rubber bullet, and specialty impact munition (SIM) weapons.
  15. Any other equipment as determined by a governing body or a state agency to require additional oversight.
  16. Notwithstanding paragraphs (1) through (15), "military equipment" does not include general equipment not designated as prohibited or controlled by the federal Defense Logistics Agency.
- B. "Board of Supervisors" or "Board" shall mean the elected Board of Supervisors of the County of Alameda.
  - C. "Sheriff's Office" or "ACSO" shall mean the Sheriff's Office of the County of Alameda.
  - D. "ACSO Military Equipment Inventory" refers to a detailed list of the military equipment requested, procured, and used by the ACSO, along with its approval status will be maintained. The ACSO Military Equipment Inventory will be updated as changes are made, dated accordingly, and presented annually to the Board of Supervisors.
  - E. "Military Equipment Coordinator" shall be a Lieutenant in the Planning & Research/Accreditation section of the ACSO's Management Services Division as appointed by the Division Commander.
  - F. "Military Equipment Request Form" shall refer to an internal ACSO form used by ACSO members to detail the requested military equipment item they wish to procure. This completed form shall be approved by the responsible Division Commander of the unit and then provided to the Military Equipment Coordinator. The Military Equipment Request Form shall include all necessary information to comply with the requirements of AB 481.
  - G. "Type" shall mean each item of Military Equipment that shares the same manufacturer's model number.

**9.45.040 – Military Equipment Funding, Acquisition, and Use Policy**

- A. Approval Required: The ACSO shall obtain the approval of the Board in a regular meeting of the Board before engaging in any of the following activities:
  1. Requesting military equipment made available under Section 2576a of Title 10 of the United States Code.
  2. Seeking funds for military equipment, including, but not limited to, applying for a grant, soliciting, or accepting private, local, state, or federal funds, in-kind donations, or other donations or transfers. The ACSO has authority to apply for funding prior to obtaining Board approval in the case of exigent circumstances, but ACSO shall obtain Board approval as soon as practical.
  3. Acquiring military equipment, either permanently or temporarily, including through borrowing or Leasing.

4. Collaborating with another law enforcement agency in the deployment or use of military equipment within the County of Alameda and the territorial jurisdiction of the Board.
5. Using any new or existing military equipment for purposes, in a manner, or by persons not previously approved by the Board pursuant to this Order.
6. Soliciting or responding to proposals for, or entering into an agreement with, any other person or entity to seek funds for, apply to receive, acquire, use, or collaborate in the use of, military equipment.
7. Acquiring military equipment through any means not provided in above sections 1-6. This includes acquiring military equipment through the various government surplus property programs.
8. The approval process will be implemented for all military equipment obtained on or after January 01, 2025. No later than May 1, 2022, the ACSO shall commence a governing body approval process in accordance with this section, if ACSO seeks to continue the use of any military equipment that was acquired prior to January 01, 2022. If the Board does not approve the continued use of a type of military equipment, the ACSO must not use the equipment beyond 180 days following the Board decision, absent a later proposal.
9. All military equipment authorized for use by the Board may be operated by any ACSO member who is properly qualified and trained.

#### **9.45.045 – Required Information Provided to the Board**

- A. In seeking the approval from the Board, the ACSO shall submit a proposed Military Equipment Use General Order (G.O) as it pertains to the requested military equipment to the Board and make those documents available on the ACSO's website at least 30 days prior to any public hearing concerning the military equipment at issue. Any proposed or final Military Equipment Use G.O. shall be made publicly available on ACSO's website for as long as the military equipment is available for use.
- B. The ACSO will provide the Board with a detailed list of military equipment during the approval/requesting process (use attached Military Equipment Request form), including:
  1. A description of each type of military equipment, the quantity sought, its capabilities, expected lifespan, and product description from the manufacturer.
  2. The purposes and authorized uses for which the ACSO proposes to use each piece of military equipment.
  3. The fiscal impact for each piece of military equipment, including the initial cost of obtaining the military equipment and the estimated annual cost for use and maintenance of the equipment.
  4. The legal and procedural rules that govern each authorized use.

5. Required training for the use of each piece of military equipment, including any course required by POST that must be completed prior to any piece of military equipment being used.
6. The mechanisms to ensure compliance with this order are well-defined and outlined in the related General Orders and written directives referenced on page 1. The ACSO is responsible for ensuring compliance and establishing legally enforceable sanctions for violations where applicable. The Board is responsible for reviewing the ACSO's compliance with this Chapter, the ACSO's General Order, and any applicable state or federal laws or regulations.
7. The procedures by which members of the public may register complaints or concerns or submit questions about the use of each specific type of military equipment, and how the law enforcement agency will ensure that each complaint, concern, or question receives a response in a timely manner (See section.G.4 and G.5 below).

#### **9.45.050 – Annual Reporting**

- A. Annual Reporting: The ACSO shall submit an Annual Military Equipment Report to the Board for each type of military equipment approved by the Board. This annual report shall be the responsibility of the Military Equipment Coordinator and shall be submitted within one calendar year of the previous Annual Military Equipment Report.
  1. The Annual Military Equipment Report shall be publicly available on the ACSO website for as long as the military equipment is available for use.
  2. The Annual Military Equipment Report shall, at minimum, include the following information for the immediately preceding calendar year for each type of military equipment:
    - a. A summary of how the military equipment was used and the purpose of its use.
    - b. A summary of any complaints or concerns received concerning the military equipment.
    - c. The results of any internal audits, any information about violations of the Military Equipment Use G.O., and any actions taken in response.
    - d. The Total annual cost for each type of military equipment, including acquisition, personnel, training, transportation, maintenance, storage, upgrade, and other ongoing costs, and from what source funds will be provided for the military equipment in the calendar year following the submission of the Annual Military Equipment Report.
    - e. The quantity possessed for each type of military equipment.
    - f. If the ACSO intends to acquire additional military equipment in the next year, the quantity sought for each type of military equipment.
  3. Within 30 days of submitting and publicly releasing the Annual Military Equipment Report, the ACSO shall hold at least one well-publicized and conveniently located community engagement meeting, at which the general public may discuss and ask questions regarding

the Annual Military Equipment Report and the ACSO's funding, acquisition, possession, or use of military equipment.

- B. If the Board does not approve the continuing use of military equipment, within 180 days of submission of the military equipment request to the Board, the ACSO shall cease its use of the military equipment no later than the 180th day, until it receives the approval of the Board in accordance with this order.

#### **9.45.060 – Compliance**

- A. Compliance: ACSO shall develop policies to ensure compliance with this ordinance. Any ACSO member who uses any piece of military equipment shall do so for official law enforcement purposes only, in compliance with all ACSO written directives and State and Federal laws, and in a manner that respects the privacy of our community. The ACSO written directives governing the use and training of military equipment include, but are not limited to, the following and as amended from time to time:
- a. G.O. 1.05 – Use of Force
  - b. G.O. 1.08 – Annual Weapons Proficiency Training and Re-Qualification
  - c. G.O. 1.21 – Less Lethal Weapons Systems
  - d. G.O. 2.45 – AR-15 Semi-Automatic Rifle Deployment
  - e. G.O. 5.07 – Special Operations Group
  - f. G.O. 5.30 – Operation of Agency Emergency Vehicles
  - g. G.O. 6.15 – Small Unmanned Aircraft System (sUAS)
  - h. G.O. 6.16 – Special Purpose Vehicles and Animals
  - i. OES P&P 4.01 – Mobile Command Center
  - j. Special Response Unit (SRU) Policy & Procedure (P&P) 3.02 – Specialized Weapons, Equipment, Munitions and Chemical Agents
  - k. SRU P&P 3.03 – Tactical Response Vehicles
  - l. SRU P&P 3.04 – Long Range Acoustical Device (LRAD)
  - m. POST SWAT Guidelines (recommendations, not mandates)
  - n. National Tactical Officers Association Tactical Response and Operations Standard for Law Enforcement Agencies (recommendations, not mandates)
  - o. FAA Regulation 14 CFR Part 107 – sUAS Operations
  - p. ACSO sUAS Operations Manual

q. The ACSO will comply with Assembly Bill 48 and PC 13652 when responding to assemblies, protests, demonstrations, or any other crowd management situations.

r. PC 835a – Objectively Reasonable Force to Effect Arrest; Use of Deadly Force

#### **9.45.065 – Discipline Procedures**

A. ACSO shall develop discipline procedures for violations of this ordinance. All instances of non-compliance will be reported to the Board via the Annual Military Equipment Report.

#### **9.45.070 – Responsibilities of the Military Equipment Coordinator**

B. The responsibilities of the Military Equipment Coordinator, or their designee, include, but are not limited to:

- a. Acting as a liaison to the Board for matters related to the requirements of this ordinance.
- b. Identifying equipment that qualifies as military equipment that the ACSO intends to acquire and that requires approval by the Board.
- c. Conducting an inventory of all military equipment, at least annually, and submitting the Annual Military Equipment Report, as documented in section 9.45.040 of this ordinance.
- d. Collaborating with any allied agency that may use military equipment within the jurisdiction of the ACSO.
- e. Preparing for, scheduling, and coordinating the annual community engagement meeting, which includes:
  - i. Publicizing the details of the meeting.
  - ii. Preparing for public questions regarding ACSO's funding, acquisition, and use of the military equipment.
- f. Monitoring the public access and complaint email address and ensuring timely responses.

#### **9.45.080 – Public Access to Information and Complaints**

A. ACSO shall create a dedicated email address to receive inquiries regarding military equipment use. Any member of the public can register a question or concern regarding the ACSO's use of military equipment by emailing the ACSO. This email address will be located on the ACSO website and monitored by the Military Equipment Coordinator, or their designee. The ACSO will respond to inquiries in a timely manner. This email address is designated solely for questions or concerns related to the use of military equipment. For all other inquiries related to the ACSO, the public should refer to the ACSO's website.

- B. Members of the public can submit complaints by visiting the citizen complaint page on the ACSO's public website.

**9.45.090 – Coordination with Other Jurisdictions**

- A. Coordination with Other Jurisdictions: Military equipment should not be used by any other law enforcement agency or ACSO member unless the military equipment is approved for use in accordance with this order.
- B. Maintenance/Inventory of Military Equipment Supply Levels: When stocks of approved military equipment have reached critically low levels, or have been exhausted, the ACSO may order up to the previously authorized capacity without Board approval to maintain essential availability for ACSO needs and Mutual Aid requirements.

**9.45.100 – Annual Review**

The Board of Supervisors shall annually review this ordinance during a public hearing to determine whether each type of military equipment identified has complied with the standards for approval set forth in County of Alameda General Ordinance Code Chapter 9.45. If the Board determines, based upon a review of the annual report, that each type of military equipment identified has not complied with the standards for approval set forth in Chapter 9.45, the Board may either disapprove a renewal of the authorization for a type, as defined, of equipment, or amend the Use Policy where it determines that the equipment does not comply with the above-described standards for approval.

**9.45.110 – Severability**

- A. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this chapter, or any application thereof to any person or circumstance, is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a decision of a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions or applications of this chapter.
- B. The Board of Supervisors hereby declares that it would have passed this chapter and each and every section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, and word not declared invalid or unconstitutional without regard to whether any other portion of this chapter or application thereof would be subsequently declared invalid or unconstitutional.

**SECTION III**

This ordinance shall take effect on the 31st day after final adoption.
